Basic Education Minister Angie Motshekga visited the Free State on 12 August 2018 as part of her outreach programme to monitor the Second Chances Programme. This is one of the department's initiative to provide Grade 12 learners who did not pass their examinations, to repeat the subjects they failed in their first attempt.

The department has recognised that most learners fail to repeat their Grade 12 due to various reasons hence the second-opportunity programme was created to enable them realise their dreams. Minister Motshekga said the Free State Provincial Government has perfected the programme as it has allocated resources to it. She said it was very critical for the youth to have a qualification as it is a minimum requirement almost everywhere.

The Minister also reflected on how the department could improve the programme by adding vocational courses, which will provide skills to the youth. Tshepo-Themba Secondary School principal said one of the main challenges was not having a permanent venue to give support to these learners.
