District hosts an AID\$2016 men's dialogue

The International AIDS Conference, commonly known as AIDS2016, held from 18 to 22 July 2016 in Durban, was the catalyst for government, civil society, traditional leaders and men to raise awareness and communicate achievements on HIV and AIDS in the John Taolo Gaetsewe District.

The dialogue, planned by the District AIDS Council, various coordinators, government and civil society was intended at changing perceptions and responses to the HIV and AIDS statistics in the region.

Over 100 residents, including men and women attended the event in support of educating people about the disease.

One of the speakers at the event, Clement Mojaki of Amogelang Botlhe Hospice in Maruping, touched on the relationship that they have developed with government in fighting the

disease. "We have seen many achievements in our lifetime such as receiving antiretrovirals in our communities. We need more dialogues like this one to make men and women understand the disease and stand together to fight it," he said.

He further said that while clinics were doing more to reach the public, many people were still too shy to access the services that are already available to them.

The event was also attended by officials from the departments of social development and health, and the United Manganese Wellness Centre, who presented an overview of all the available support services of HIV and AIDS programmes in the area.

Issues raised during the dialogue ranged from the need for further education and training, family counselling, the release of available HIV and AIDS statistics as well as regular communication projects at taverns and other hotspots.

The event was preceded and closed with a candlelight ceremony in remembrance of those living and affected by HIV as well as those who lost their lives to due to the disease.



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Doreen Maholoeng said:

"I learned about safety and protection issues in connection with HIV and AIDS. I am also very appreciative of government for coming to Seoding and have this dialogue here. It was good that I was able to hear that I also need to be supportive, help government and be part of the solution."





Norah Dlamini said:

"My husband worked in a mine for 30 years but we did not get even a cent. I was told that he was not registered. I have eight children to feed and educate. I was very happy when this opportunity to help ex-mineworkers was opened for us. Finally, government will investigate what happened to the money we were supposed to receive after my husband passed on. Even his younger brother was hit by a mine bus at the mine and nothing was provided to compensate his family."

Government steps in to assist former miners

Dumisani Mtshali said:

"I want to express my gratitude to government for opening up this opportunity to investigate on our behalf. I worked in a granite mine. I was retrenched. I am not satisfied with the little that was given as a package. I think now we will be able to get help that we were waiting for all these years."

The Imbizo provided a platform for the Ministers and the ex-mineworkers to engage in robust discussions with the view of working together to address, among others, the issue of compensation for the former workers, as well as socio-economic challenges.

Minister Oliphant stressed the importance of workers' rights and how the Department of Labour is ensuring that workers are not exploited. She briefly explained that government is implementing laws that must be respected by all employers. The Minister further mentioned how the department has revised fines compelling employers to comply. She said the department will embark on massive training programmes that will benefit both workers and employers including the courts. Responding to issues raised by ex-mineworkers, the Minister referred people with issues to the complaints desk where they would be assisted. She concluded her speech with information on a comprehensive government programme to collectively address issues of compensation and socio-economic challenges.

Deputy Minister Oliphant, further warned the workers and ex-mineworkers about third parties who are robbing people, promising to claim compensation on their behalf. He said government has established interventions to ensure that unpaid monies reach people. The Deputy Minister mentioned that the department is working hard to stop illegal mining. He invited interested people who can be assisted where legal mining opportunities are available, to access funding. He also explained that government is taking care of ex-mineworkers through medical examination benefits and that there are programmes to train them in agriculture, which are subsidised by government in partnership with the private sector

MEC for Economic Development, Tourism and Environmental Affairs, Sihle Zikalala encouraged retrenched miners to explore other business opportunities after explaining the department's programmes aimed at developing businesses cooperatives.

Minister Oliphant responded to numerous issues that were raised by workers and ex-mineworkers that are still challenging them to help move the workers forward.





Tyrese Budaloo said:

"I always wanted to enrol for automotive repairs and maintenance but I did not have information about institutions that offer the course. Today I am grateful that I was able to get all that information."



Ncobile Mtshali said:

"The expo was helpful as a young person I intend to become a social worker. Due to my financial circumstances I thought I could not afford to do so but now I know that government is making strides in providing greater access to funding for learners like me."
