Ensuring safe scholar transport

The South African National Taxi Council (SANTACO) in the Inanda, Ntuzuma and areas of eThekwini Municipality, led an Operation Hlokomela outreach at Ntuzuma outside the J.G. Zuma High School on 19 January 2022, as schools reopened.

The eThekwini Acting Manager for Operation Sukuma Sakhe in the Northern Region, metro police and the Government Communication and Information System (GCIS) participated in the outreach, which was aimed at monitoring the roadworthiness of taxis, check if the taxis were not overloaded and that the drivers, learners and other passengers were wearing masks.

The exercise was fruitful, as only a few taxi drivers were pulled over for overloading their vehicles. Passengers were asked to disembark, and were directed to other taxis to continue their journey.

Two taxis were found to be unroadworthy, one of which had to be towed away.

Taxi drivers and learners were warned about not wearing masks. SANTACO also handed out masks to drivers, learners and other passengers.

All subsidiary taxi associations in the area were represented at the activation and non-complying taxi drivers were referred to the relevant taxi association representative for further assistance or discipline.

The GCIS also distributed government messages on the COVID-19 vaccines to encourage vaccination.

Community outreach campaign at Mqanduli

She further said the President needs to also touch on the development of schools, as some of them are not in a good state and lack proper sanitation.

The SoNA provides the President with an opportunity to speak to the nation and reflect on economic and social Issues that affect South Africans. The public is urged to participate in the upcoming SoNA.

With Stats SA being part of the campaign, Mqanduli residents also got the opportunity to ask questions about job opportunities that come with the Census 2022 and acquired more information about the census and why it should be done.

Young people who wanted to register in order to get employment for the census programme were also assisted.

"South Africa is in need of engineers, pilots and other specialised field workers. Therefore, the sanitary towels we are giving to you today are meant to keep you in class and ensure that you never miss a day in class due to lack of confidence during your menstrual cycles," she said.

Delivering the keynote address, Deputy Minister Siweya said that the only way which young women can develop themselves is through studying.

"But you cannot develop yourselves if there will be days where you cannot attend classes due to lack of these necessities. Hence government, in partnership with the private sector, came here to ensure that you are in class and receive quality education without missing a day."

Nkomazi Local Municipality Mayor told learners that the municipality is always willing to help deserving learners who have shown true commitment to their studies.

Minister monitors schools in Sedibeng

The Minister of Basic Education, Angie Motshekga, accompanied by the Gauteng provincial and district leadership in education, visited selected schools in the Sedibeng District Municipality to monitor the status of readiness as learners returned to school on 24 January 2022.

The schools were Sicelo Primary School, Sebokeng Technical High, and Mahareng Secondary School, and the visit was concluded by a stakeholder meeting at Vereeniging.

School leaders were engaged and the Minister emphasised the importance of parents' involvement in schools.

"It is important to have active parents participation in school to support leaners and teachers. This plays a major role and assists the department to understand the social dynamics that the learners face and also makes it easy to implement remedial actions as part of learner support programme," she said.

Some of the challenges facing some of the schools are crime and vandalism of property.

The "adopt a cop" programme was identified as one of the interventions that will assist in curbing this challenge.

The programme aims to enhance police participation in schools by assigning police officers to specific schools to support and offer safety and security services, including random school searches.

"Having dedicated police officials will assist a lot in addressing safety challenges that we face in our schools because officials will always be available to assist," said Peter Segasa from Mahareng Primary School.

Principal Elizabeth Ntsoko of Sedibeng Technical High School said, "I appreciate the monitoring visit that was conducted in our school, especially because we are a school for learners with special needs and we need every available support for the well-being of our teachers and learners."
