National Human Rights Day commemoration

The National Human Rights Day commemoration event was hosted at Reagile Sportsground in Koster, North West on 21 March 2022, under the theme: "The Year of Unity and Renewal: Protecting and preserving our Human Rights Gains".

The event, led by the Department of Sports, Arts and Culture in partnership with various stakeholders, brought along service trucks and information stalls to the people of Kgetlengrivier Municipality.

While giving the keynote address, President Cyril Ramaphosa reflected on the brutal shooting of unarmed protesters in Sharpeville on 21 March 1960, and the killing and wounding of people in Skierlik by a white gunman, Johan Nel, on 14 January 2008.

The President said, "These incidents sadden and anger us, and they should. These incidents have no place in our society, where we still struggle to heal the divisions of the past."

Government engages community members

On 7 March 2022, community members from Emalahleni Local Municipality in Mpumalanga were afforded an opportunity to host the Presidential Climate Commission (PCC). It sought to discuss and receive inputs and comments from various invited stakeholders on the developed draft Just Transition Framework for South Africa, which was developed in 2021 by the PCC and published for further inputs and comments until 31 March 2022.

Dr Crispian Olver, who serves as a secretariat in the PCC, gave a brief background, overview and the role and responsibilities of the commission.

The stakeholders were then afforded an opportunity to voice out their concerns, which are seen as hindrances towards the implementation of the 'Just Transition' and ways to deal with them. They submitted various issues, which included empowering and supporting women, particularly those in rural areas; the issues of illnesses caused and exacerbated by the mining emissions that pollute the air and in some instances lead to water contamination and suppression; high rate of job losses in the mining sector and others; rapid closing down of power stations; negligence towards the children belonging to foreign nationals; lack of basic services and by-laws within local municipalities; dysfunctional hospitals; post COVID-19 Economic Recovery and Reconstruction Plan; consultation with the traditional leadership; the impact of load shedding on businesses and livelihood in general; clear and attainable social and labour plan, and rehabilitation plan by the mining sector; and lack of skills and skills transfer.

In closing remarks, Ayakha Melithafa, a youth commissioner and a climate justice activist, said "All the things spoken about here are those that are reflected in the commission. As young people we must know that we deserve to be in this space, we must look at stakeholders that have been left out so that they can be involved when we return as a commission. It is our mission as a commission to ensure that next time we have a community engagement here, we host the session at the right time and accessible dates and ensure that the languages spoken are those that can be heard and understood by most of the people."

Melithafa further assured the participants that their concerns and inputs have been noted. "I want to assure you all that everything you said here today, did not fall on deaf ears. We heard you all, as a commission," she concluded.

The session was attended by representatives from various civil society organisations, South African National Civic Organisation and other labour organisations, Eskom, South African Women in Mining Association, the Department of Mineral Resources and Energy, Emalahleni Municipality, SASOL, Government Communication and Information System, Office of the Premier and others.

Mathew Hlabane said:

"Just Transitions is not about the Independent Power Producers, it is about communities and workers participating and deciding their future. I am appealing that the commission needs to come back to Emalahleni because the invitation did not reach many."



Jabulisile Makhubo said:

"All relevant stakeholders must be present when engagements of this nature are held so that questions can be directed to them, not to the commission. I also request that information about these events be shared with our local municipalities so that we can access it.

Youth access health services
