

VOX-POPS: Presidential Inauguration, Church Walk Durban City Hall, eThekweni, KwaZulu-Natal





Lennox Magas 32 –Unemployed, Ward 02: We are voting but have nothing, no jobs no hope as the President is sworn he must create opportunities for us to get jobs.



Cedric Pelman 33 –Unemployed, Ward 03: There is no work here at all we want equality even to the Jobs that are created by the Municipality of Inkwanca. EPWP jobs are given to the different race which is blacks. Street lights are dead for Years now here in town. President Jacob Zuma must come and see this.



Ayanda Ndleleni 35 –Unemployed, Mamaela Street ward 1: There are actually no Job opportunities, we get jobs from the Plaas owners and get paid R50 that's how we survive here. The President must help us.
