

It is a booklet that contains information that young people need to empower themselves.

It provides specifically contact numbers of departments, institutions and organisations that offer services or programmes that the youth can tap into to improve their lives.

How will it help you?

This booklet will provide you with a:

FDUCATION>

- In 2012/13 we had 12 433 949 million learners in over 25 000 schools.
- Grade R enrolment have more than doubled between 2003 and 2011.
- The move towards universal Grade R has been a key achievement in the education system.

Working together we have done more.

- In 2012 gross enrolment at primary school shows the country having achieved close to universal access to primary education for both genders. Enrolment for the five-year-old age group which was at 22.5% per cent at the 1996 Census leapt to 81.2% in 2011.
- For the six-year-old age group, these figures were 49.1% in 1996 and 92.7% in 2011.
- The results also show that individuals aged 20 and older, who have no schooling, halved from 19.1% in 1996 to 8.6% in 2011.

The National Youth Development Agency (NYDA)

Government established the NYDA to:

- advance youth development through guidance and support to initiatives across sectors of society and spheres of government
- embark on initiatives that seek to advance the economic development of young people
- develop and coordinate the implementation of an integrated youth development plan and strategy for the country.

As part of its information services and communication programmes, the NYDA provides youth with information and counselling support through its various service-delivery channels, including youth advisory centres (YACs).

The NYDA's YACs are walk-in centres where trained personnel provide information, counselling support, training and referral services to young people. YACs offer information and support across a wide range of issues and topics such as career guidance and entrepreneurship, job preparation and other life skills and provide referral services. There are different types of YACs:

Full-service YACs: A full-service YAC is the largest version of a YAC with the added advantage of offering all the NYDA services under one roof e.g. business loan finance, business consultancy services vouchers, training and access to the National Youth Service programme.

YAC points: A YAC point is a smaller version of a YAC, providing similar services as a YAC but without full access to NYDA products and services. However, YAC points have the added advantage of being even closer to communities. The NYDA is currently collaborating with public Further Education and Training (FET) colleges, labour centres and municipalities for the placement of YAC points and is continuously looking to form more strategic partnerships.

Mobile YACs: A mobile YAC is a mobile version of a YAC with the added advantage of movement between various locations. Mobile YACs also provide outreach services to communities that are unable to access the YACs, by taking career, skills development and information entrepreneurship to the youth in their communities.

YAC kiosks: A YAC kiosk is the smallest version of a YAC, usually a shelf containing information with limited face-to-face assistance. YAC kiosks are usually located in places such as churches, community structures and tribal authorities.

YACs are open to all from Monday to Friday, from 08:00 to 17:00. There are currently 121 YACs and YAC points in operation.

- Progress was made with the provision of free basic education for all, with over eight million learners (approximately 70 per cent per cent of all learners) now in no-fee schools.
- Grade 3 literacy levels increased from 48 per cent in 2009 to 52 per cent in 2012.
- Matriculants obtaining Bachelor qualifications increased from 19 per cent in 2009 to 27 per cent in 2012.
- Learners with access to workbooks and textbooks increased from 64 per cent in 2009 to 99.4 per cent with access to textbooks and 98.0 per cent with access to workbooks in 2013.

He has also founded the Silulo College, a training facility which aims to offer internationally accredited courses in the Eastern and Western Cape as well as Gauteng. 



 Growth and Development Summit in June 2003 resolved that an EPWP would be established to ensure that R100 billion of planned government expenditure be targeted for employment-intensive programmes.

 R15 billion of the conditional infrastructure grants allocated to provinces and municipalities from 2004–2009 had been earmarked for the EPWP.

- The EPWP Economic Sector programmes created 20 514 work opportunities over the five-year period, thus surpassing the set target of 9 000 by a significant margin.
- The Community Work Programme provides up to 100 days employment per year to unemployed people in poor communities.
- The Community Work Programme runs in all nine provinces, 45 municipalities and 417 wards. From April 2010 to March 2011, 89 689 work opportunities had been created throughout the country.
- Share in household income of the poorest 40 per cent of households was 5.6 per cent in 2011.



programme that promotes teaching in public schools. Full-cost bursaries are available to enable eligible students to complete a full teaching qualification in an area of national priority. Recipients of these bursaries will be required to teach at a public school for the same number of years that they receive the bursary.

Social Work

Bursaries for those interested in studying Social Work are provided by the Department of Social Development. (The student applies for the bursary at the provincial department's offices.) National Skills Fund (NSF)

Bursaries from the NSF are available for students with a study focus in a scarce skills area. Universities determine which students qualify for these moneys. There are no conditions attached to these bursaries.

Some of these may be relevant to young people, and by receiving them, many lives can be improved. These are:

Child Support Grant (CSG)

To qualify for a CSG, you must:

- be the child's primary caregiver (e.g. parent, grandparent or a child over 16 years heading a family)
- be a South African citizen or permanent resident
- not earn more than R31 200 per year if you are single; if you are married, your combined income should not be above R62 400 per year.

The child must:

- have been born after 31 December 1993
- not be cared for in a state institution
- reside with the primary caregiver who is not paid to look after the child.

Both you and the child must live in South Africa.

Disability Grant

If you have a physical or mental disability which makes you unfit to work for a period of longer than six months, you can apply for a Disability Grant.

You get a permanent Disability Grant if your disability will continue for more than a year and a temporary Disability Grant if your disability will continue for a continuous period of not less than six months and not more than 12 months. A permanent Disability Grant does not mean you will receive the grant for life, but just that it will continue for longer than 12 months.

You must:

- be a South African citizen or permanent resident or refugee and living in South Africa at the time of application
 - be between 18 and 59 years if you are female or 18 and 60 years if you are male

- not be cared for in a state institution
- have a 13-digit, bar-coded Identity Document (ID)
- not earn more than R44 880 if you are single or R89 760 if married; your assets must not be worth more than R752 400 if you are single or R1 504 800 if you are married
- undergo a medical examination where a doctor appointed by the State will assess the degree of vour disability
- bring along any previous medical records and reports when you make the application and when the assessment is done.

how do i apply for a social grant?

Social grant applications are administered by the South African Social Security Agency (Sassa). Information on social grants is available on the South African Government Services website (www.gov.za) in all South African official languages, or you can visit www.sassa.gov.za to find out more.

identity documents

An ID is important to get as soon as you are eligible (from 16 years of age) as it proves your identity. The green bar-coded ID is also a legal form of identity when dealing with public and private institutions. There are many occasions when you will be requested to provide a copy of your ID - for example, for access to housing, education and healthcare services; to apply for a driver's licence or a job; or when entering into business agreements.

You will also need an ID to apply for a passport, and visas to work, study or visit friends and family overseas. You will also need your ID to register to vote in general and municipal elections. IDs are issued to South African citizens or permanent residence permit holders who are 16 years or older.

You can apply for your ID at any office of the Department of Home Affairs or any South African mission or consulate overseas.

Provide your cellphone number in your application so that you can receive regular updates on the progress of your application by SMS. To get the SMS updates, simply SMS the word " D" followed by your ID number to 32551. You will be charged RI for each SMS sent.

Substance abuse

A number of studies show that South Africa is experiencing a sharp increase in young people abusing substances like drugs and alcohol. Many of the patients admitted to rehabilitation and treatment centres for substance abuse are children aged as young as eight to 10. Drug and alcohol abuse at a young age is often the result of peer pressure, which starts at school.

Government clinics do HIV testing free and free condoms are provided at healthcare centres and many other public buildings.

incentive schemes

In an effort to increase industrial competitiveness and broaden the participation of enterprises in the economy, the Department of Trade and Industry (dti) provides financial support to qualifying companies in various sectors of the economy. Financial support is offered for various economic activities, including manufacturing, business competitiveness, export development and market access, as well as foreign direct investment.

Small, medium and micro enterprises (SMME) development incentives

Black Business Supplier Development Programme

The BBSDP is a cost-sharing grant offered to small black-owned enterprises to assist them to improve their competitiveness and sustainability in order to become part of the mainstream economy and to create employment.

The BBSDP provides a grant to a maximum of R1 000 000 (R800 000 maximum for tools, machinery and equipment and R200 000 maximum for eligible enterprises to improve their corporate governance, management, marketing, productivity and use of modern technology).

Cooperative Incentive Scheme (CIS)

The CIS is a 90:10 matching cash grant for registered primary cooperatives (a primary cooperative consists of five or more members who are historically disadvantaged individuals). The CIS is an incentive for cooperative enterprises in the emerging economy to acquire competitive business development services. The maximum grant that can be offered to one cooperative entity under the scheme is R350 000.

Technology and Human Resources for Industry Programme (THRIP)

The THRIP is a partnership programme funded by the dti and managed by the National Research Foundation (NRF). On a cost-sharing basis with industry, THRIP supports science, engineering and technology research collaborations focused on addressing the technology needs of participating firms and encouraging the development and mobility of research personnel and students among participating organisations.

industrial development. related incentives

Business Process Services (BPS) Incentive

The South African Government is implementing a Business Process Outsourcing and Offshoring (BPO&O) incentive programme as from July 2007. Between July 2007 and March 2010, the incentive resulted in the creation of at least 6 000 new jobs and R303 million in direct investment. attracted

The BPS Incentive aims to attract investment and create employment in South Africa via offshoring activities.

Capital Projects Feasibility Programme (CPFP)

The CPFP is a cost-sharing programme that contributes to the cost of feasibility studies likely to lead to projects outside South Africa that will increase local exports and stimulate the market for South African capital goods and services.

The size of the grant must fall within the range of R100 000 to R5 million to a maximum of 55% of the total cost of the feasibility study for projects in Africa and 50% for projects outside Africa.

Clothing and Textile Competitiveness Improvement Programme (CTCIP)

The CTCIP aims to build capacity among clothing and textile manufacturers and in other areas of the apparel value chain in South Africa to enable them to effectively supply their customers and compete on a global scale. Such competitiveness encompasses issues of cost, quality, flexibility, reliability, adaptability

Manufacturing Investment Programme (MIP)

The MIP is a reimbursable cash grant for local and foreign-owned manufacturers who wish to establish a new production facility; expand an existing production facility; or upgrade an existing facility in the clothing and textiles sector.

Foreign Investment Grant (FIG)

The FIG compensates qualifying foreign investors for costs incurred in moving qualifying new machinery and equipment (vehicles excluded) from abroad to the Republic of South Africa.

Tourism Support Programme (TSP)

The TSP is a reimbursable cash grant that aims to support the development of tourism enterprises that will stimulate job creation and increase the geographic spread of tourism investment. The grant is for the establishment or expansion of tourism operations such as:

- accommodation services
- passenger transport services
- tour operators
- cultural services, and recreational and entertainment services.

Production Incentive (PI)

Under the PI, applicants can use the full benefit as either an upgrade grant facility or an interest subsidy facility, or a combination of both.

Eligible enterprises include:

- clothing manufacturers
- textile manufacturers
- cut, make and trim operators
- footwear manufacturers
- leather goods manufacturers
- leather processors (specifically for leather goods and footwear industries).

Sector-Specific Assistance Scheme (SSAS)

The SSAS is a reimbursable 80:20 cost-sharing grant offering financial support to export councils, joint action groups and industry associations. The maximum allocation per project is R1,5 million.

Support Programme for Industrial Innovation (SPII)

The SPII is a support programme of the dti, managed by the IDC. The SPII is designed to promote technology development in industry in South Africa through the provision of financial assistance for the development of innovative products and/or processes. The SPII specifically focuses on the development phase, which begins at the conclusion of basic research and ends when a pre-production prototype has been produced.

Seda Technology Programme (STP)

As part of the Government's strategy to consolidate small-enterprise support activities since April 2006, the activities of the Godisa Trust; the National Technology Transfer Centre (NTTC); the three business incubators of the dti, the Technology Advisory Centre (TAC); the technology-transfer activities of the Technology for Women in Business (TWIB) programme; and the support programmes for small enterprises of the South African Quality Institute were merged into a single programme - the Seda STP.

Isivande Women's Fund (IWF)

IWF is an exclusive women's fund established by the dti. The fund aims at accelerating women's economic empowerment by providing more affordable, usable and responsive finance. IWF targets formally registered enterprises, where 60% is owned and/or managed by women. The enterprises must have been existing and operating for two or more years and must fall within a loan range of R30 000 to R2 million.

trade export and investment incentives

Critical Infrastructure Programme (CIP)

The CIP is a cost-sharing cash grant for projects designed to improve critical infrastructure in South Africa. The grant covers qualifying development costs from a minimum of 10% to a maximum of 30% towards the total development costs of qualifying infrastructure. It is made available to approved eligible enterprises upon the completion of the infrastructure project concerned. A cash grant to a maximum of 30% capped at R30 million for the development cost for qualifying infrastructure is available.

Export Marketing and Investment Assistance (EMIA)

 The dti assists South African exporters by organising national pavilions to showcase local products at international trade exhibitions.
- International trade exhibition assistance
 The dti provides financial assistance to export
 councils, industry associations, provincial trade
 and investment-promotion agencies, joint

- Group outward-selling missions.

Film and Television Incentive

The South African Government offers a package of incentives to promote its film production industry. The incentives consist of the Foreign Film and Television Production Incentive to attract foreign-based film productions to shoot on location in South Africa and the South African Film and Television Production and Co-Production Incentive, which aims to assist local film producers in the production of local content.

- There is a vast improvement in the representation of women in all three tiers of government since 1994. The representation of women in the National Parliament increased from 27.8% in 1994 to 43,3% in 2009
- There was a substantial increase in households that had access to piped water from 80.3% in 1996 to 91.2% in 2011.
- Households that have flush toilets connected to the sewerage system increased from 50% in 2001 to 57% in 2011.
- Households with no toilets declined significantly from the 13.3% in 2001 to the 5.2% in 2011.
