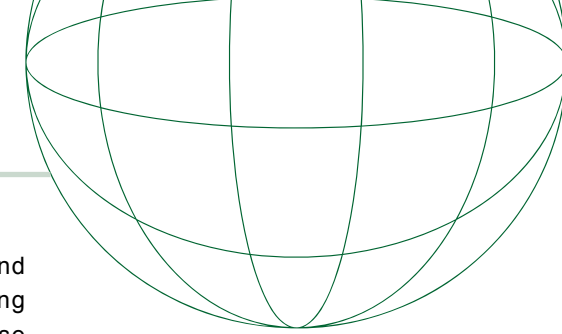
Multiple government departments and state agencies converged at Nangoza Jebe Hall on 3 November 2016. On 4 November, the same services were offered in Walmer.

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Social Development Month aims to engage communities to identify their challenges and put together action plans to deal with these challenges. SASSA was aiming at informing communities about different social security programmes available to them and how these can be accessed. In his presentation, the District Manager, Vuyo Toto, mentioned challenges that they come across, which include lack of knowledge within communities, struggling to register for the benefits because the required documentation is unavailable and other more challenges.

Among other departments that were present at these event are the departments of health, labour and social development, Government Communications and Information Systems and the Nelson Mandela Bay Municipality Customer Care Unit.

Communities were afforded an opportunity to seek clarity on the presentations that were made while services continued to be rendered at different service points and members of the community served on a one-on-one basis.

This concerted approach to government services and community engagement saw the community of Walmer and New-Brighton afforded the opportunity to raise questions directly to government leaders who gave them responses directly as part of a two-way communication instantaneously.

Government programme changes people’s lives

The Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP) established by the government in April 2004 to increase employment opportunities and skills development, is flowing smoothly for iMpendle Local Municipality. The programme started operating in 2009 in the area and it has already created employment opportunities for 68 people, which include men, women and young people. This government initiative is led by the Department of Public Works.

Phelelani Bhengu has worked in the programme for five years. He says he is very excited about this programme because it has afforded him the opportunity to obtain a bricklaying certificate. “We are doing the most extensive work, more than anticipated because the municipality has only 17 full-time general workers. Our contribution ensures that the town is clean.”

He said his life has changed a lot since he entered into the system and is now able to put food on the table. He added that the municipality should look at options to absorb them permanently.

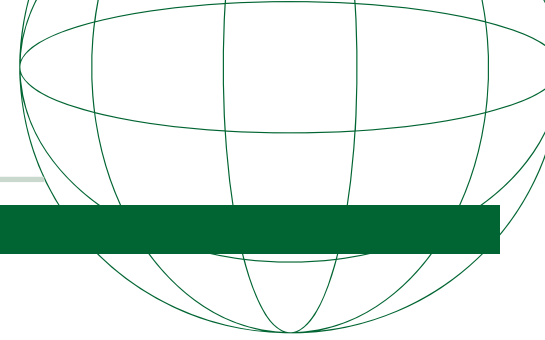
Sthembile Sokhela described the process as the most helpful one: “With the small amount of money we receive, we are able to feed our families,” she said. She also said she and other colleagues in the programme do not enjoy equal treatment when it comes to employee’s rights such as entitlement to public holidays, and urged management to look into the issue.

Sandile Mkhize, who works as the Local Economic Development Officer under the Impendle Municipality, said the EPWP ensures that participants receive training to perform some tasks before they exit the programme. He said in 2015, a total of 17 participants were trained in bricklaying and the other 33 were trained to become security personnel.



Phelelani Bhengu said:

“EPWP has assisted us, we are able to put food on the table. Though on contract, I am thankful for the opportunity to upgrade myself. Today I have a certificate in bricklaying, the only thing missing is permanent employment.”

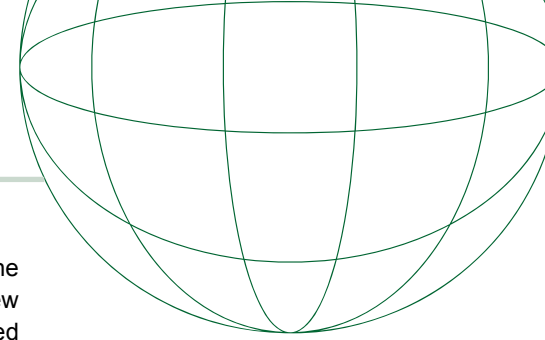

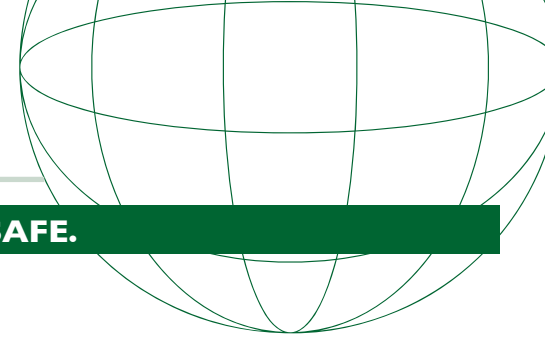

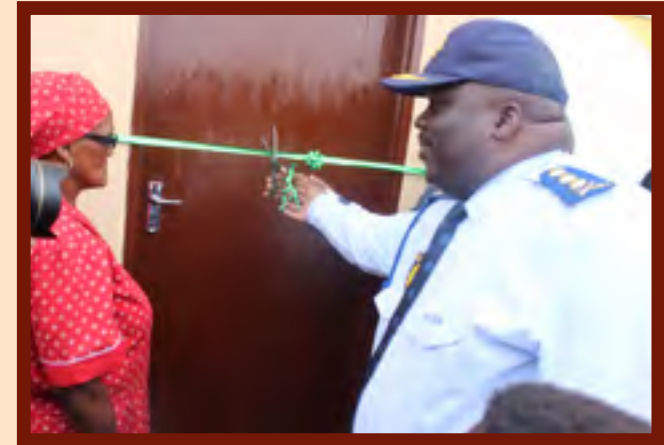

Government declares war against violence and abuse

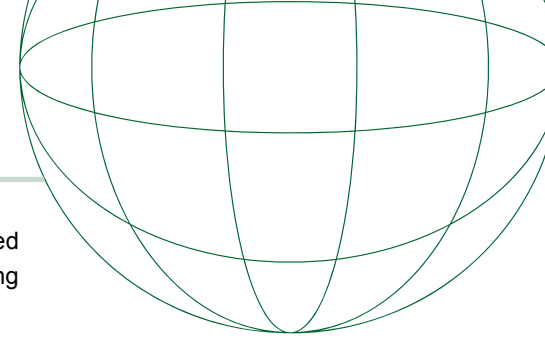

On 26 November 2016 Mpumalanga MEC for Community, Safety, Security and Liaison, Petrus Ngomane, handed over two fully furnished brand new houses to two beneficiaries who had previously been living in shacks. This was during the provincial launch of the 16 Days of Activism for No Violence against Women and Children campaign at Saul Mkhizeville, Mkhondo Local Municipality. The beneficiaries are 66-year-old Nompi Shongwe who is living with her grandchildren and the 28-year-old Nomusa Gumbi who leaves with her five orphaned siblings.

“Down with the abuse of women and children down! Domestic violence and abuse must fall!,” said Councillor Daniel Thwala.

When handing over the house to Shongwe, MEC Ngomane said, “We are visiting you today on a special day when we advocate for the protection of women and children and by giving you this house today as a symbol of protection. We want to say we commit ourselves as government to protect women and children”.



Sipiwe Hadebe said:

“As a young woman in the women’s league we strongly condemn any form of domestic violence, and abuse of women and children. I was happy today, because we were taught not to hide criminals, or perpetrators of abuse in our homes.”

In the formal event held at Saul Mkhizeville, MEC Ngomane addressed the community members who attended. In his address he urged community members especially women not to hide perpetrators of abuse. He made a stern warning and cautioned women who give their children to step-fathers and to the so called “blessers”, that they must not hide abusers. The law will take its course. He urged community members to report crime and in particular, incidents of domestic violence and abuse.
