Importance of protection orders in the fight against GBVF

On 17 September 2025, the Government Communication and Information System (GCIS) in partnership with Legal Aid South Africa (SA), arranged an interview at Mokopane Community Radio to educate community members on the importance of protection orders and drafting of wills during National Free Wills Week.

Ms Ntanganedzeni Mbezi, a legal practitioner from the Legal Aid SA's Mokopane office, shared important information with listeners on the importance of a protection order and that it was not just a paper, but a legal document valid for five years, that could be used to apply for protection against domestic violence and is served by the South African Police Service

(SAPS). "A protection order can protect an individual from any form of abuse: financial, emotional, sexual and physical. Abuse must be reported immediately to the SAPS, and communities must not wait long before opening a case. Individuals can apply at any Magistrate Court where the abuser stays," she said.

Ms Mbezi also encouraged community members to apply for free wills during National Free Wills Week between 15 and 19 September 2025. Information was shared about who should apply for a will, where the wills be kept and what happens when a person dies without a will. Public education to end cyberbullying

A public education session was held on cyberbullying at the Old Prison in Pietermaritzburg, with participation from several high schools across the Greater Edendale area, on 30 September 2025.

The programme, led by the Government Communication and Information System (GCIS) in partnership with the Film and Publication Board (FPB), South African Police Service, departments of Home Affairs, Basic Education and M3 Digital aimed to raise awareness on the effects and impact of cyberbullying, particularly among young people. The initiative was to ensure that all social partners played a role in crime reduction by encouraging learners to avoid involvement in criminal activities from an early age. Students also used the platform to educate one another about the dangers of cyberbullying, its harmful consequences, and ways it can be prevented.

FPB official, Ms Nosipho Dladla, delivered an insightful presentation on the different forms of cyberbullying and how it can be addressed within schools. She emphasised that cyberbullying can have severe consequences for those affected, including depression and in extreme cases, suicide.

She further cautioned that individuals involved in cyberbullying could face arrest and urged the police to play an active role in prevention initiatives.
