Services taken to the people

As part of pre-State of the Nation Address (SoNA), the Government Communication, in partnership with the Western Cape Provincial Government, Department of Local Government in the Western Cape and the Thusong Service Centre programme in the provinces hosted a service delivery integration outreach incorporating Government Exhibition Day at Struisbaai on 6 February 2024.

The fishing community of Struisbaai, with a total population of just over 3 000 people, was excited and welcomed the various services and information offered on the day by government and non-governmental institution. Fishermen were afforded an opportunity to check the status on the two-way radio licences for their fishing boats with Independent Communications Authority of South Africa, and fishing permits with the Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment.

The Special Investigating Unit, HAWKS, the National Prosecution Authority, Department of Justice and Constitutional Development provided community members with critical information on how they can work closely with law-enforcement agencies to root out corruption and crime in general in their communities.

The National Consumer Commissioner, Office of the Consumer Protector engaged community members on how to report service providers that do not abide with the National Consumer Act, 2008 (Act 68 of 2008), the Department of Sport, Arts and Culture explain and handed out the easy to learn sign language cards.

Community members were also able to check their voter registration status and test their sugar blood pressure levels, with the Department of Health.

Young people engaged with the South African National Defence Force on requirements to apply to the SA Navy, SA Airforce and Military.

Radio Overberg, which is the local community radio station was also present with an outside broadcast to give listeners first-hand information on their mandate by giving each organisation a chance to speak on what they represent and how the community can access their services.

Community members were also made aware of the 2024 SoNA and were invited to watch President Cyril Ramaphosa deliver it.

Presidential bridge changes lives

President Cyril Ramaphosa officially opened the Presidential Welisizwe Bridges at Esigodini on 31 January 2024 in the presence of Cabinet members, KwaZulu-Natal leadership, community members and the South African National Defence Force (SANDF) before he met with scores of people and stakeholders at Ngilanyoni Sports Field where he engaged with them on government plans and achievements. The project aimed to provide access to amenities and facilities which naturally would be difficult to access due to natural barriers (rivers and streams) and is a collaboration between the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure, Department of Transport and the SANDF. The President has commended the work of the SANDF and thanked them for their contribution in protecting the country and improving the social well-being of underprivileged communities mainly in rural parts of South Africa. The project forms part of government priority areas, rural development and safe communities.


