Karoo communities receive news publication

In January 2023, the first copy of *Indaba News* was published and 10 000 copies were distributed to eight small towns within the Dr Beyers Naudé Local Municipality. The founder of the publication, Everton Williams, said that it is truly humbling to see the appreciation of the publication from the community. "My dream has always been for my community to have a platform for news, information and entertainment. A platform that would not only bring the community together; but also connect those who are far away from home and connect us as a community to the rest of the world," Said Williams.

In November 2021, the Government Communication and Information System (GCIS) conducted a community engagement session in Graff-Reinet to discuss the possible establishment of a community-radio platform that would serve a source of news and information in the Karoo. This was simply to advocate for the community to organise themselves and explore the possibility of a communication medium that would serve all communities within the Dr Beyers Naudé Local Municipality. The GCIS roped in the Media Development and Diversity Agency, and Independent Communications Authority of South Africa, to engage the community on their support offerings to

communities/groups in pursuit of community communication mediums.

From that session, a working task team was established to work on the project. Its main responsibilities were to engage and consult with the necessary entities for the establishment of the radio platform, ensure that all the necessary requirements were met for the application process and that the community gains a community radio licence

The GCIS convened a number of stakeholder consultations in pursuit of the establishment of a community radio platform. Parallel to the initial plan; Williams initiated *Indaba News* with the MDDA. In December 2022, the paper was approved for funding by the MDDA.

Almost a year later, it employs four full time and three casual employees, and continues to distribute 10 000 copies monthly. The publication has also gained momentum through its digital platforms. Williams says that his vision is to make *Indaba News* a daily news digital mobile app with reach the national audience. "I also want to establish good stakeholder relations that will help sustain Indaba News," he said.

Men's lives matter

The Tarlton Stakeholders in partnership with the Government Communication and Information System, various government departments and non-governmental organisations on 29 September 2023 hosted an Imbizo at the Nelson Mandela Community Hall targeting men living in and around the area of Tarlton. The purpose of the programme was to bring men under one roof to discuss issues affecting them such as mental health, prostate cancer, gender-based violence, where to seek help regarding issues that are directly and indirectly affecting them.

The programme was conducted as an information-sharing session with different stakeholders who engaged participants on various issues. These came from sectors such health, agriculture, business and some to engage on social ills that men go through. Dr Boitumelo Seome, a clinical psychologist from Leratong Hospital said the rate of suicide and addiction among men is alarming, and only because men do not know how to seek for help or some are even embarrassed to do so. He encouraged men not to be afraid to seek for help if things get too hard for them.

"Men need to understand that they are also human, they are not immune to mental illness, abuse, addiction or many other issues they think only women go through. You do not have to confide in any family member, our public health systems have people who are qualified, trained and well-equipped to help with any issues that you might be dealing with," said Dr Seome.

He encouraged men to talk and to stop making a joke out of other men when they talk, that even if they do laugh, the most important thing is that you had the courage to seek help. Dr Tholithemba Mzobe from West Rand District Health also gave participants a short but important lesson about prostate cancer and the importance of frequent health screenings. He said, "My concern as a doctor is that black men do not go for cancer screening, they do not take care of their health. I am hoping that after today we will see more men visit the local clinic to do screenings."

A representative from Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development, Ike Mohlala, spoke on the effect that unemployment and lack of income has on some men, especially if they have always been able to provide for themselves and their families.

"The department is available for those who want to learn how to plant. We provide free training and assist in opening a cooperative if only you have the proper documents to use the land," he said.

He also encouraged men to group themselves together and find ways to work as a team in opening cooperatives that the department can support.

Other stakeholders that were part of the event included the Department of Home Affairs, Mogale City Local Economic Development and Westview Clinic.
