Farmers' Open Day promotes agriculture as a business

On 13 October 2023, a number of farmers attended the Farmers' Open Day organised by the Free State Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (DARD) at Middelbult Farm in Petrusburg, Free State.

The owner of the farm, Ms Mirriam Daka (39), who has been passionate about farming since a young age, acquired the farm through funding from the DARD in May 2018.

The purpose of the Farmers' Open Day was to encourage young subsistence and emerging farmers to take agriculture as a business to improve their lives. Local commercial farmers who also attended the event shared their expertise on crop and livestock farming.

The Small Enterprise Development Agency outlined their non-financial assistance to businesses, including the farming sector. Farm employees were encouraged to dream big and learn as much as possible from their current employers so that they can gain the necessary leadership and management skills.

Farmers exhibited their produce and handmade items at the stalls while various government departments and entities promoted their institutions and provided some services to the farmers.

Water conservation awareness campaign targets kids

Preaching the gospel of saving water to young people could help the drought-stricken Nelson Mandela Bay Municipality (NMBM) save water. The Government Communication and Information System (GCIS), in collaboration with the NMBM, recently conducted a water-awareness campaign at the Kids Castle Pre-School.

The GCIS conducts the ongoing water-awareness campaign to ensure that people in the Metro conserve water to mitigate potential drought.

Before the recent rains, the Nelson Mandela Bay was heading for Day Zero, as local dams were starting to run out of water. Although dam levels are currently over 70% full, people have been urged to continue conserving water.

The NMBM's Public Relations and Events Coordinator, Ms Mercy Thinyane, told the Kids Castle Pre-School learners about the importance of conserving water.

"Water is important, we cannot do anything without water, and we need water to wash, for cooking and for watering our plants. We cannot survive without water, animals cannot survive without water and plants cannot survive without water," she said.

Ms Thinyane also taught them a water-wise song: "If it's yellow let it mellow, if it's brown flush it down." The kids also took part in a quiz with questions on how to save water.

Presidential Imbizo attracts multitudes of people

On 20 October 2023, more than 10 000 people gathered at the Ikageng Sports Complex, in the JB Marks Local Municipality within the Dr Kenneth Kaunda District Municipality in North West, where President Cyril Ramaphosa undertook the second leg of the District Development Model (DDM) Presidential Imbizo in the province.

The President was accompanied, among others, by the Minister of Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs, Ms Thembi Nkadimeng, North West Acting Premier, Mr Nono Maloyi, Dr Kenneth Kaunda District Mayor Nikiwe Num, the North West House of Traditional Leaders led by Chairperson Kgosi Seatlholo, various Cabinet Ministers, and North West members of the executive councils, mayors and councillors.

The North West DDM Presidential Imbizo aimed to bring government services closer to the people of Ikageng township and surrounding areas, to assess the availability of enabling infrastructure, evaluate levels of coordination across all spheres of government and interacting with the community on the challenges they face. Furthermore, government provided feedback from issues raised during the previous Presidential Imbizo held in Mahikeng, through various programmes and plans implemented. The theme of the Presidential Imbizo was "Leave No-One Behind", in line with government's collaboration with all sectors of society to transform the country through a sustainable, equitable and inclusive economy.

In his February 2022 State of the Nation Address, President Ramaphosa undertook to interact with communities in all provinces. A significant number of people from different parts of the province came to raise issues related to service delivery to President Ramaphosa and his delegation. The responses to the questions reaffirmed government's commitment to expedite

the process of resolving service-delivery issues, working together with business and community members in the province. Some of the issues raised included the high rate of crime, poor maintenance of roads, electricity, illegal mining (zama zama) operations, water and sanitation, illegal foreigners, unemployment, corruption and general poor performance of municipalities in the province

President Ramaphosa visited the Ikageng Water Reservoir Works Project funded through the Department of Water and Sanitation's Regional Bulk Infrastructure Grant. The reservoir, with a capacity of about 25 megalitres, will supply water to various communities of Ikageng.

Over 22 000 households are expected benefit from the successful completion of the reservoir. Kgosi Seatlholo said: "We look forward to the youth and graduates in our communities to make a more valuable contribution to the growth of our economy. We envision the DDM as a peoples' programme and not as a government programme."

Acting North West Premier Maloyi said: "We have commenced with programmes of Operation Bulela Metsi through the intervention of Water and Sanitation Minister Senzo Mchunu." The Office of the Premier has, through the Thuntsha Lerole Programme, visited several municipalities in North West to ensure access to service delivery across the province.

Tumelo Ntsetse said:
