Youth dialogue on youth development

On 20 June 2019, the Government Communication and Information System (GCIS) hosted a youth dialogue at Kenton-on-Sea. The event was attended by approximately 90 young people and the programme was led by the Speaker of Council for Sarah Baartman District Municipality, Cllr Mzimkhulu Njadayi. The session enabled community members to receive information on employment, skills development and small business development.

Various stakeholders such as the National Youth Development Agency (NYDA), the Department of Rural Development and Agrarian Reform and the GCIS made presentations to empower the youth who were in attendance. The NYDA shared information on business training, employment seekers' database and grant funding that it offers to young people under the age of 35. The Department of Rural Development and Agrarian Reform encouraged youngsters to consider Maths and Physical Sciences at school and explained about the bursaries offered by the department, for horticulture, veterinary science and many others. The department also mentioned that it assists farmers from small backyard farming to commercialised farms. Community members were encouraged to consider a career in agriculture.

Cllr Njadayi also announced that the district municipality has allocated R750 000 to assist young people in business. He mentioned that the fund would work similarly to the NYDA grant funding but that it would be much easier and quicker to access. He, however, reminded the youth that they need to have passion for business. The event took place a few hours before President Cyril Ramaphosa delivered the State of the Nation Address, and the youth anticipated to hear him speak about youth development and job creation.


National Human Rights Strategy launch

The Human Rights Strategy was launched on the eve of the 9th International AIDS Conference that took place at the Durban International Conference Centre from 12 to 13 June 2019. The strategy serves to strengthen the rights of women, children, people with disabilities, people living with HIV and AIDS, and the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Intersex (LGBTI) community, prevent discrimination, human rights violations and stigmatisation.

Preceding the launch of this strategy, stakeholders together with community organisations staged a march from King Dinizulu Park to Gugu Dlamini Park. The park was named after an HIV and AIDS activist who was murdered after publicly declaring her HIV status 21 years ago. The march raised awareness of the protection of human rights for all people regardless of the diversity of sexual orientation, gender, type of work, HIV and AIDS, and other health status and physical abilities. Of concern was the numerous human rights violations suffered by people living with HIV and AIDS, women, children, people with disabilities and sex workers. The launch paid tribute to the courageous Gugu Dlamini and asserted that no other human being shall be subjected to the pain and suffering she went through.

The march was led by the Minister for Health, Zweli Mkhize, Premier of KwaZulu-Natal, Sihle Zikalala and the MEC for Treasury, Ravi Pillay together with members of the South African National AIDS Committee and United Nations agencies, ambassadors, and the Global Fund. Participants included various civil society organisations, faith-based and community-based organisations. They entered the Gugu Dlamini Park, carrying powerfully worded placards about non-discrimination, de-stigmatisation, self-stigmatisation, respect for diversity, respect for women and children and also respect for human rights. The march achieved its objectives through the wide stakeholder participation and placards in raising awareness, speaking against human rights violations and educating the public about the right to dignity and respect for other people’s human rights.
