G20 Workshop held in KZN to empower local communities

With South Africa hosting the Group of Twenty (G20) Summit in November and holding working group meetings, the Government Communication and Information System (GCIS), together with eThekwini Business Support, ClIr Sihle Mazibuko, the OSS War Room and community development workers, held an Economic Empowerment Workshop at the Nkanyisweni Hall, KwaMashu Section. The workshop was held on 16 July 2025 to inform and educate attendees on the purpose of the G20 and possible resultant economic opportunities.
