### Government supports farmers

The Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development, Mcebisi Skwatsha, handed over agricultural equipment to farmers in the Garden Route District on 18 September 2022.

The Thembaletu Small-scale Farmers, Mossel Bay African Farmers Union, Brakkerkloof Farmer and Friemersheim Egg Producers, received approximately R12 million from the department as part of infrastructure support.

The farming equipment handed over includes tractors, vehicles, protective gears, fencing, pellet machine maker, medicines and animal feed.

Dorothy Joseph, a manager at Friemersheim Egg Producers said, "We farm egg-laying chickens and have 3 100 chickens that produce 250 dozen eggs a day."

"We thank the department for the assistance with the donation of a delivery vehicle, which will help with the deliveries and pick up of packaging materials. This vehicle will help us a lot, since we used to hire transport and that was very expensive.

"The assistance we have received from various departments and stakeholders is not only in monetary value, but also in training and equipment. With the help of government, we can take our business forward to grow as a commercial business where we can compete with big corporates," said Joseph.

**State-of-the-art studio for Engcobo FM**

The Minister in the Presidency Mondli Gungubele and the Acting CEO of Media Development and Diversity Agency (MDDA), Mzuvukile Kashe, opened the new-state-of-the-art radio station studio sponsored by the MDDA to Engcobo FM on 9 September 2022.

The MDDA creates an enabling environment for media development and diversity, which reflects the needs and aspirations of all citizens, and ensure inclusive participation of historically disadvantaged communities.

Working with the Government Communication and Information System, the MDDA has a mandate to provide access to information and proactively create platforms for communities to engage with government.

Engcobo FM will spread out government community engagements on matters of economic development and encourage people to contribute to local economy and job creation.

Engcobo FM Station Manager Lusindiso Tansi said, “MDDA has been absolutely amazing throughout the entire experience. The coordinators that were allocated to the radio station made numerous visits to Engcobo, guiding us through the processes to follow in using the funds.

“They checked and helped to tick all the boxes until the end. The process of applying for funding was very straight forward and rewarding as an experience because it is all about compliance and accountability”.

He alluded that he believes MDDA is structured correctly with all the necessary paperwork. Tansi also said he will ensure that the radio licence remains compliant and up-to-date.

His message to unemployed youth was to say they must not give up but search throughout the province and the entire country for opportunities that will plug them into any kind of programme, be it an internship or any programme provided by government.

“The youth should work hard to stay away from alcohol and drugs because they make life unpleasant. The station has young people who are going to be busy and their hopes are alive and well because they kept hoping and searching for opportunities,” concluded Tansi.

### Oversight visit to tackle illegal mining

The parliamentary portfolio committees on Home Affairs, Police and Mineral Resources and Energy visited North West on 15 and 16 October 2022 respectively, in a quest to evaluate the state of illicit mining activities.

The joint oversight visit started in Stilfontein, Klerksdorp, where the portfolio committees’ members engaged with the stakeholders who are combating illegal mining, together with the community representatives.

The Deputy Provincial Commissioner of the South African Police Service (SAPS), Major-General Patrick Asaneng, presented a comprehensive report of operations and partnerships that are working tirelessly to combat illegal mining in North West.

Various challenges and successes were shared with the portfolio committees. The Department of Mineral Resources and Energy, Department of Home Affairs and SAPS responded to the various questions raised by members of the portfolio committees and noted the recommendations for implementation.

Community representatives who were present at the gathering also highlighted the challenges that illegal miners bring to their residential areas. They indicated that there is a need for intensive police visibility as the illegal miners are heavily armed and cannot be approached by communities.

Affected mine shafts where illegal mining activities take place were visited by the portfolio committees’ members.

This oversight visit comes just a few days after the Minister of Police, Bheki Cele, visited the Stilfontein area where 20 suspects of illegal mining with high-calibre weapons were arrested.

Minister Cele promised that the SAPS is more than capable of dealing with illegal mining. He said that they were anticipating more arrests of illegal miners and kingpins behind the operations.

North West is part of the five illegal mining hotspot provinces in the country and the joint committee has now visited all of them.

The committees will deliberate on their observations together with the presentations given and recommend that their report be tabled for adoption by the National Assembly. The visit was concluded in the Mooinooi area in Rustenburg.
