Madimbo Thusong Service Centre delivers services to the people

As part of reducing poverty and tackling the high cost of living, community members from Madimbo and surrounding areas gathered at the Madimbo Thusong Service Centre on 30 June 2025, to access much needed services.

The initiative is one of the government programmes which aims to improve the living conditions of the marginalised and bring services to the doorsteps of people living in rural communities. The Thusong Services Centre programme requires the public and private sectors to render services collectively under one roof and cut travelling costs for the community.

Community members were able to certify documents, apply for social grants and check progress on their different applications with the South African Social Security Agency (SASSA). The Department of Home Affairs (DHA) gave young people an opportunity to apply for identity documents (IDs), while the elderly applied for Smart ID cards. Standard Bank and ABSA were also present to assist beneficiaries open new accounts.

SASSA Acting District Head in the Vhembe District, Mr Mavhungu Tshipuke, stated that the agency rendered services every Tuesday at Madimbo Thusong Centre, and is dedicated to ensuring that they always paid social grants to the right people at the right time and place.

Musanda Vho-Nemadimbo appreciated the good initiative by government. Expressing his gratitude, he said, "From the onset, the initiative of Madimbo Thusong Centre was a way of advocating government and private sectors to bring services closer to the people and render them in a safe place. Today I witnessed the happiness of my subjects after accessing services within travelling cost. The little money they have will bring food to the table. I say bravo to the government and private sector for the wonderful job they are doing for our community."

The Media Development and Diversity Agency (MDDA) handed over state-of-the-art radio studios on 11 July 2025. The Sajonisi Youth Radio Station funded by the MDDA, is equipped with new, technologically advanced equipment. The support comes as part of government interventions to increase community media platforms that have played a significant role since the dawn of democracy and continue to inform and educate communities.

Sajonisi Youth Radio Station, with presenters who are mostly young people, plays a vital role in being a voice for the community of Port St Johns, a platform to share stories and provide access to information. Through the station, we can reach other people living with disabilities and make them aware of issues that affect them," said Ms Nombini Maza from the Port St Johns Disability Organisation. She further stated that when they have awareness campaigns on disability, the station helps them with publicity.
