Minister monitors vaccination sites

The Minister of Health, Joe Phaahla, visited the Universitas Academic Hospital vaccination site in Bloemfontein on 17 September 2021. The purpose of the visit was to give support and monitor the provincial COVID-19 vaccine rollout programme.

Economic opportunities for youth

The Government Communication and Information System (GCIS) in partnership with the Great Kei Local Municipality and Amathole District Municipality held a Women and Youth Empowerment Hybrid Seminar on economic opportunities on 27 August 2021 at Mzwini Community Hall in Mooiplaas.

The objectives of the seminar were to expose, empower and capacitate women and youth on various economic opportunities, enterprise funding or development schemes.

Skills development and entrepreneurship support programmes that are provided by government, entities, parastatals and other partners were also outlined.

Zuko Patuluko of Kei Mouth town expressed gratitude on the seminar programme and challenged the youth to take up the programmes and opportunities outlined by various departments and entities.

He also urged government to strengthen the idea of the oceans economy and the participation of youth as the Great Kei Municipality is largely a coastal area.

Nomagcina Soduka who owns 4U&4ME Cooperative, an entrepreneur in the agriculture and poultry industry was able to engage the district municipality on the issue of water cuts and its effects on the growth of her enterprise.

She added that the platform has exposed her to more information on how she can access other markets for her products and how the use of digital skills can boost her market.

Walk to restore peace

Following the July civil unrest and resulting racial tensions, discrimination and violence among communities of Phoenix and Bhambayi, Zwelisha and Amawoti, a peace task team, comprising sector departments, the eThekwini Metropolitan Municipality and civil society was established to restore peace in the area, render services and support families of the deceased victims and survivors of the unrest.

Education and awareness campaigns, support and assistance, including food hampers, psycho-social counselling and other poverty alleviation measures were provided to the affected communities.

As part of the continued interventions, KwaZulu-Natal Premier Sihle Zikalala together with the provincial Members of the Executive Council staged a peace walk from the Rydalvale Ground in Phoenix to Bhambayi Sports Ground, on 14 September 2021.

The walk served to heighten awareness of peace interventions in the area, promote harmonious co-existence between various communities and showcase the strength of a South African nation united in its diversity.

Premier Zikalala further unveiled the new "One Nation" peace symbol at Rydalvale Ground, designed by a young graphic designer called Tshiamo Molehabangwe.

Carrying placards that displayed messages such as "KZN Rising and Rebuilding," "Sakha imiphakathi ebumbene," "One Nation", "Let's build a non-violent society", participants from Phoenix, Bhambayi, Inanda, Ntuzuma and KwaMashu walked side-by-side from Rydalvale to Bhambayi.

In addition to the peace walk, the Premier addressed the community at the Bhambayi Sports Ground, amplifying the values and prescripts of the Freedom Charter and the South African Constitution.

He appealed for peace and harmony from all communities and patience with the criminal justice processes.

In addition to the Premier's speech, the proceedings in Bhambayi also included an interfaith prayer, speeches from various community leaders, release of doves in memory of the deceased and a closing address and prayer by Bishop Reuben Phillips.
