#### South Africa moves to digital television

During the 2021 State of the Nation Address, President Cyril Ramaphosa announced that South Africa must complete the broadcast digital migration by 31 March 2022, for all households to move to digital television.

South Africa is committed to fulfil the international treaty obligation to switch from analogue to digital television broadcasting, as agreed with the international telecommunications union.

The old analogue television signal will soon be switched off in all provinces in the country. Households that have already migrated to the digital system will not be affected by the analogue switch-off.

Government has been providing free set-top boxes and installation to households with a monthly income of not more than R3 500. The registration, which began after 31 October 2021 will only be connected within three to six months after the switch-off.

The Department of Communications and Digital Technologies in partnership with the South African Post Office hosted an outreach programme on 26 October 2021, to mobilise the community of Seretse, Boshof in Lejweleputswa District, to register to receive subsidised set-top boxes from government at their nearest post office.

The Universal Service and Access Agency of South Africa also attended the event to deal with connectivity challenges from those who were already connected.

Citizens who still use aerial/antenna mounted on a pole to watch television and those who do not have set-top box or smart television set, should find themselves a set-top-box or a smart television to be able to receive digital television.

Benefits of digital migration include: efficient use of spectrum, improved quality, improve media quality of service, and it grants South Africans a developmental opportunity.

Digital television will offer citizens, improved free-to-air services, and more channels.

## Government engages farmworkers on farm evictions

The Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development, Mcebisi Skwatsha, addressed farmworkers on support opportunities available to them following threads of job losses and possible evictions in the Villiersdorp area on 17 October 2021.

The COVID-19 pandemic negatively affected various sectors of the South African economy.

The agricultural sector, which provides job opportunities to one of the most vulnerable groups of the labour force, farmworkers, was hard-hit by restrictions on international exports. This resulted in farms not being profitable and job opportunities being under threat.

Farmworker unions extended an invitation to the Ministry of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development following complaints received from farmworkers facing job losses and evictions.

The area, Vyeboom, which falls under the Theewaterskloof Local Municipality, is among the farming areas with high numbers of evictions.

Deputy Minister Skwatsha explained that the Extension of Security of Tenure Act, 1997 (Act 62 of 1997) is to facilitate legally secure tenure for people living on land that belongs to someone else in rural and peri-urban areas.

He further explained that the Act regulates the conditions upon which these tenure rights may be exercised and wherethe rights of persons who reside on land may be terminated.

The Act addresses issues long-term for occupiers, the conditions to reside on land, the conditions and certain circumstances that can lead to termination of right of residence, and lastly the condition and circumstances under which people can be evicted from land.

The District Director of the Overberg and Cape Winelands District, Esmerelda Reid said the challenge facing the department is that some farmworkers do not report these eviction cases to their offices. She encouraged them to contact the department on such issues.

#### Imbizo addresses crime

Police Minister Bheki Cele and South African Police Service (SAPS) senior leaders provided the community with a platform to discuss and engage them on various issues concerning crime. The Imbizo was held in Nyezane under Inkosilangalibalele Municipality on 22 October 2021.

Issues discussed include stock theft, murder, robbery and other crimes plaguing this community. Community members were afforded an opportunity to raise their concerns on crime.

Minister Cele told them he had brought in new management for the Amangwe SAPS to improve the way they work with the community. He further said he hoped that all perpetrators would be brought to book soon and that order would be restored in the area.

The Minister also said that many suspects have been arrested in the area, and he urged the community to work with the police.

Minister Cele was accompanied by the Uthukela District Mayor, Simphiwe Mazibuko, Inkosi Mazibuko, Mayor of Inkosilangalibalele Municipality Councillor Jabulile Mbhele and SAPS leaders.
