Freedom Month activation

Furthermore, community members were encouraged to report GBVF cases, anonymously. Before the event, flyers and posters were shared with community members. The GCIS and community development workers also shared information about their services and how they can be reached.

South Africa and Zimbabwe strengthen relations

The Executive Mayor of the Vhembe District Municipality (VDM), Dowelani Nenguda and his counterpart, Luka Ndou, of the Beitbridge Rural District Council in Zimbabwe, signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) at the Mapungubwe Heritage Site's Museum Hall on 14 April 2023. The MoU aimed to promote viable economic and cultural development as well as social cohesion within the two neighbouring municipalities.

The Beitbridge border post separates the two municipalities. The signing ceremony was attended by, among others, members of the house of traditional leadership, and representatives from academic institutions such as the University of Venda (Univen) and Vhembe Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) College. Dean Alunamutwe Rannditsheni represented faith-based organisations in the VDM area.

Executive Mayor Nenguda urged both municipalities to develop the programme of action to help fast-track the whole developmental processes in areas such as exhibition, trading and exchange programmes for students from University of Zimbabwe.

"Today, we are here to witness the rebuilding of a historic event as two separated twins are rejoining to build a vibrant economy and cultural development for their countries. This partnership/agreement is not only limited between the two local councils but goes beyond as it will help the development of the Southern African Development Community (SADC) region. It speaks to the international relations between our two countries. This MoU is going to affect different areas of our economic sectors in our two regions, and I can say today that the Musina-Makhado Special Economic Zone (SEZ) is already in full swing. The SEZ is going to be the economic hub of our region, and this MoU will pave a way for the proper implementation of this megaproject, for the development of our economy," Nenguda said.

Executive Mayor Ndou warmly welcomed the positive action taken by the two countries and the two districts separated by a river. "The agreement will bring a lot of development across the SADC region. South Africa is in negotiations of using water from Zimbabwe to ensure that the SEZ becomes a success. This agreement would enable the two countries to trade. Vhembe is more advanced in farming production and this will be used to our advantage to produce quality products using a South African breed," said Ndou.

"Education is a critical tool for the transformation of individuals and society, that is why as institutions of higher learning, we are here today to have first-hand information on how the agreement looks like. This will enables us in reorienting the curricula for sustainable development, which seeks to prepare a holistic and value-oriented individual for useful living within society."



Chief Nemutanzhela said:

"As the custodian of the people regardless of the borders, the primary mandate for traditional authority is to unite communities, that is why we are here today to witness the re-established of the historic action aimed at empowering the economy of the two bordered countries. Historically, Zimbabweans and South Africans were living together as brothers and sisters, therefore; the signed agreement today is a sign of togetherness. This agreement in future might be used to promote social cohesion across the entire continent, as it comprises high political unrest and power fighting, causing economic instability and intolerance among community members. The working together agreement will bear fruits, which will feed the two countries and provide viable economic development to be escalated across the SADC region. This, in future, will showcase the importance of working together as countries or municipalities, which might be emulated by all bordered countries across the continent."
