Government acts to address water challenges

The Minister of Water and Sanitation, Nomvula Mokonyane, and KwaZulu-Natal MEC for Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs, Nomusa Dube-Ncube led a mall and taxi activations on 15 July 2015 in iLembe and eThekweni areas. The two government leaders engaged with community members and briefed them about drought-relief programmes to be introduced by the provincial government. They spread the message about water conservation in areas that had been severely affected by low water levels. Hazelmere Dam is currently at 30% level and this affects water supply in many parts of the province. "We need to do everything that we can to save the little that we have. We are raising awareness about the shortage of water as this is not a man-made problem but is due to the lack of rainfall," said Minister Mokonyane.

MEC Dube-Ncube also said: "We are encouraged that our people have taken the call to conserve what we have seriously and to use the available water resources sparingly. Water is a scarce resource, with no substitute, and we must change our water-use patterns if we are to preserve this resource and ensure that supply meets demand. We have witnessed a significant decline in the pace of water outflows from our dams since the water rationing commenced."

The day concluded with different religious groups coming together to pray for divine intervention at Hazelmere Dam. Minister Mokonyane and MEC Dube-Ncube also attended the prayer session.



Farmer empowers communities

Maria Swele is the owner and founder of Maria Swele Project. The 34-year-old woman hails from Ephraim Mogale Local Municipality. She owns a 32-hectare farm that produces cotton, maize and peanuts. She sells her products to local customers and those beyond her village.


Swele started her farming career in 2004 after being encouraged by her former employer. She started on a four-hectare farm ploughing maize.

“Due to my commitment in cotton farming, I received a helping hand from government through skills development, provision of manure, seeds and assistance in soil sampling,” she said. Swele has 112 employees comprising 105 women and seven men. Twenty-two of them are permanently employed while the others are seasonal workers.

She also does social responsibility work in Maklerekeng village. “I provide soup and also polish shoes for 68 destitute children at Maklerekeng drop-in-centre, where I am also a board member,” she said with a smile. “Learners from neighbouring schools also come to have practical lessons about what we do on a daily basis,” she added.

Through her hard work, Swele was able to save money and bought herself farming implements such as a tractor, disc harrow and a planter. This saves her time and money that she would spend hiring these implements.

The businesswoman is determined to expand her farm to 200 hectares so that she can create more jobs and eradicate poverty.


