School camps improve Mpumalanga matric results

The Mpumalanga class of 2014 did exceptionally well in their matric exams. The provincial aggregate reached 79% pass rate. Despite the increased pass rate, Mathematics remains a huge concern. Mpumalanga learners obtained only 392 Mathematics distinctions, much fewer than last year's 529.

The MEC for Education, Reginah Mhaule, said that this was the first time the province had performed above the national average of 75,8%. She further outlined that the results had been declared credible by Umalusi. For the second year in succession, Hoërskool Nelspruit managed to maintain 100% pass rate, with 348 distinctions. Despite the fact that Nkomazi Local Municipality is one of the Comprehensive Rural Development Programme municipalities, its schools kept a good-performance record, thus making it the best performing municipality. This achievement is a result of a study camp that schools within the municipality took part in.


The Education department plans to improve last year's results. It plans to intensify its school-based intervention support in the 84 schools that did not achieve more than 60% and are declared dysfunctional. Furthermore, the department will conduct workshops on an on-going basis for Mathematics, Physical Science, Accounting and Economics advisors. Top learners received equipment like laptops, tablets, iPhones, microwave, kettle and bar fridge from sponsors. One learner received a Toyota Etios, sponsored by Imperial Toyota Nelspruit.

As part of the back-to-school campaign, pupils received tablets at the Tandi Eleanor Sibeko Secondary School in Duduza on 14 January 2015. Through the digital paperless classroom, pupils will receive tablets, while teachers will use interactive boards. This means that chalks and dusters are things of the past.

Speaking of the launch of the digital paperless classroom, Finance MEC, Barbara Creecy, told learners that they will no longer carry heavy books and backpacks to school. "Today we are doing something very important, we are launching the digital paperless classroom, you are no longer going to carry heavy books as all your textbooks and classroom lessons are already uploaded on tablets that you are going to receive," she said.

The MEC said that the move to digital paperless classroom will also enhance communication between teachers and learners as well as their information and communication technology (ICT) skills. She urged learners to take education seriously, arrive at school on time and respect one another and their teachers. "Be at school on time, improve on your time management and make 2015 a year of success," said MEC Creecy.

The Speaker of the Gauteng Legislature, Ntombi Mekgwe, encouraged pupils to secure and safeguard the tablets. "Do not take chances and sell these tablets because they have a tracking device. We will retrieve them, whether sold or stolen. We hope that you will


secure and safeguard them as they are allocated specifically to you," said Mekgwe.

Maths Literacy teacher, Nhlanhla Dlamini, said the use of ICT in education will improve teacher and learner communication, thereby ensuring that classroom lessons reach all pupils even if they were unable to attend lessons. Grade 12 pupils, Thapelo Phadimo and Nthabiseng Nhlapo were both excited about the gadgets and the digital paperless classroom.

"The move to digital paperless classroom will improve our performance because no one will be left behind, and if you need more explanation on any subject you can easily communicate directly with the subject teacher," said Phadimo.

"I am very excited about the gadgets because they will improve our performance. These gadgets help us with lessons and we can communicate with our teachers and fellow learners if we have challenges or need more explanation or clarity," said Nhlapo.

The digital paperless project will be launched in seven public schools in Gauteng. The aim of the project is to modernise public education and build a system that can compete internationally by bringing public schools into the 21st century. Through the digital paperless classroom, Gauteng learners will be able to engage with their teachers and will never have to carry textbooks.



Everything went well on the first day of the 2015 school re-opening in Mpumalanga. MEC for Education, Reginah Mhaule, accompanied by the Deputy Minister of Economic Development, Madala Masuku, Ehlanzeni District Mayor Letta Shongwe and Mbombela Executive Mayor Sibusiso Mathonsi visited Hoërskool Nelspruit to monitor the back-to-school programme on 14 January. MEC Mhaule said Hoërskool Nelspruit is the pride of the province because the school always excels in matric exams.
