The Grade 12 class of 2019 in Mosedi Secondary School started their schooling with much enthusiasm, encouraged and motivated by the class of 2018, which achieved improved results. The Fetakgomo Tubatse Local Municipality conducted a Back-to-School campaign on 15 January 2019, motivating learners to work hard. The initiative was led by the Acting Mayor of Fetakgomo Tubatse Local Municipality, Councillor Dorah Mphethi, accompanied by other EXCO members, the circuit manager of Dilokong and the ward councillor.

Mosedi Secondary School is one of the most improved school as far as the Grade 12 results are concerned. The school moved from 21% pass rate in 2016 to 50% in 2017 and 85,7% in 2018. "We are here to rejoice with you for this great achievement which showed a major improvement of the Grade 12 results," said the Acting Mayor. In efforts to raise awareness on the voter registration weekend which is to take place on 26 to 27 January 2019, Government Communication and Information System conducted an activation on 18 January 2018 at Mafikeng Museum. The government officials encouraged citizens to register and informed them about their democratic rights to vote in the upcoming general elections for 2019.

Members of the public were informed that voting stations will open from 08:00 to 17:00 on 26 January and 27 January 2019 to allow first-time voters to register and existing voters to update and to check their registration details.

The public can also SMS their ID number to 32810 to receive an SMS containing their registration status and the address of their voting station. Unregistered voters were told they can insert their address in the Voting Station Finder application on the website http://maps.elections.org.za/vsfinder/ to find their correct voting station or call the contact centre 0800 11 8000.

As part of the Back-to-School programme, the Gauteng Provincial Government deployed various MECs to schools in the province to check on their readiness ahead of the 2019 academic year. MEC of Finance, Barbara Creecy, was deployed to Mohlakeng Primary School on 9 January 2019 to hand over a new administration block and a computer laboratory.

Accompanied by the Randwest City Executive Mayor, Mzi Khumalo, and members of the Mayoral Committee, MEC Creecy thanked Altron, the company that provided both facilities at the school for their contribution to schools in Gauteng. "We appreciate the partnership that we have with this company in making sure that schools have good facilities and tools to make sure that learners receive the best education that they deserve. The primary school is the most important phase of a child's life and investing in this and making sure the right resources such as computers are made available put them in a better position to access information to help improve their lives," MEC Creecy said.

Teachers and learners were encouraged to take care of the new administration block comprising a kitchen, enough rooms to host all teachers and space to accommodate visitors or parents to the school instead of the old two-roomed administration block. During the walkabout around the school, MEC Creecy and her entourage were taken on a tour of the new revamped school toilets and informed on how the computer lab will be used. One of the parents, Pinkie Segametsi, was happy with the new developments. "With all these facilities, our children have an opportunity to learn more of what we never had a chance to do during our time. All parents want to see their children pass and become important people in life and all these will help them achieve that," she said.
