On 22 May 2025, the Government Communication and Information System (GCIS) hosted the Group of Twenty (G20) youth engagement dialogue at the Maluti Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) College, Kwetlisong campus. The dialogue was facilitated in partnership with the Maluti TVET College, Agape Foundation for Community Development and University of the Free State Qwaqwa campus. Ministerial outreach programme calls for strengthened collaboration between the three spheres of government

On 23 May 2025, the District Development Model (DDM) champion of the UMkhanyakude District Municipality - Minister Sisisi Tolashe undertook a ministerial outreach programme at Umhlabuyalingana-Manguzi Multi-Purpose Hall. The aim of the outreach was to bring government services closer to the people and monitor if the DDM programmes in the area are run successfully.

Stakeholders in attendance included the Departments of Home Affairs, Health, Transport, Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development and its entities. The Economic Development, Tourism and Environmental Affairs (EDTEA), the South African Police Service (SAPS), National Youth Development Agency (NYDA) and financial institutions also participated in the outreach.

The District Mayor of Umkhanyakude Cllr Sphile Mdaka honoured the programme and was joined by district executives Inkosi Mabhudu of the Tembe Traditional House and Inkosi Khulezweni Nxumalo representing the Mabasa Traditional House. During her public address, Minister Tolashe stated that the outreach was not a ceremonial event but a way to showcase how DDM works as it aims to unify all three spheres of government. She said government can effectively bring services to people if the

three spheres of government can work together. The minister applauded interventions made in the education sector in UMkhanyakude, as the district was now ranked amongst the top three districts in the country.

Minister Tolashe raised concern about the scourge of gender-based violence and femicide (GBVF) directed at women and children. She made a powerful call to action, urging communities to stand together in the fight against these entrenched social ills. Tolashe reiterated that it's not only the responsibility of Social Development and SAPS to end GBVF but everyone has a role to play.

Through the programme, at least 1000 people were reached. Civil society organisations submitted contributions to the minister to ensure that service delivery is not compromised in the district. Issues raised included requests for improved road infrastructure and providing water access for people with disabilities. The organisations also called for the Home Affairs Department in Manguzi and other government buildings in the district to be restructured to accommodate people with disabilities.

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Mr Sphiwe Manzini (representing District Disability Sector):

"As the disability sector, we are thankful for government strides in migrating the SASSA card to the beneficiary's bank of his/ her own choice. This bring about dignity, as one can withdraw money as and when wished. We plead with government to bring water access closer to the homes of the disabled people as they cannot walk long distances in need of water. We also need proper road infrastructure to accommodate disabled people on wheelchairs. We further need government to consider the needs of people on wheelchairs in government facilities and buildings that are not disability friendly. I then plead for the community and government to love us and consider us as human."



Ms Thandiwe Ngubane (representing elderly people):

"We are thankful for the older person grant we are receiving however, we are experiencing gender-based violence. These are scourges we suffer from our own grandchildren, who demand these grants when they are under the influence of drugs. More to that, our own daughters leave their children behind in search of jobs and then takes the SASSA card with them. The grant that we receive we don't enjoy since we had to put food on the table instead of taking care of ourselves. I then plead with the government to continue support and monitor the luncheon club since it brings older people together to share experiences and distress."

2025 Child Protection Week observed in style

On 1 June 2025, the Namakgale AFM Christian Devine Covenant commemorated its third annual promotion of the National Child Protection Week Campaign in a unique way. Under the theme *"Working together in ending violence against children,"* the Sunday School children were dressed up like the professionals they aspired to be when they grow up. The purpose of these outfits was to demonstrate to the parents that there is a bright future requiring the parents, the church, the police, social development and other relevant departments to work together in guaranteeing that children are safeguarded, provided for and led to a better future.

The children quoted poetry on their well-being: Such as "It should have been you Mom" which is a poem about a little girl who blames her mother for not recognising that her uncle was sexually abusing her until it became a norm. Another poem delivered was "Dear Dad" which is a letter from a youngster who expresses her sorrow over how her father abandoned her after separating with her mother causing her agony. Protecting children's rights, dignity and safety is a legal and moral obligation as stipulated in the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa and the Children's Act, 2005 (Act No. 38 of 2005).

Adhering to the current administration theme, "A nation that works for all," government continues to foster partnerships with all stakeholders including churches. Constable Rikhotso who spearheads annual awareness services in the church, was joined by Constable Molamodi who are both stationed

at Namakgale police station. Constable Rikhotso encouraged the congregation to take charge in taking care of every child regardless of whether the child is theirs or not. She also requested that the parents take charge in ensuring that they protect their children until they reach their dreams and become what they dream of. She said, "It is your responsibility to ensure that these children grow up well until they reach their dreams, until they carry the same task of taking care of their own children. The future is bright and it can only be achieved if we all work together as government (police officers) and parents to protect our children. We will look back on this time and be glad we did."

Child Protection Week attempts to draw attention to concerns affecting children's lives and this event surely achieved that goal.

Around 89 children participated in this paramount activity which encouraged parents and caregivers to recommit to building a child-friendly South Africa free from violence and harm. In her closing remarks Constable Rikhotso expressed that she loves her job especially on days where her duty goes beyond just enforcing the law but to foster a safer, better community for children and all citizens, upholding her oath to serve and protect.
