First innovative digital centre in Mthatha

The Minister of Communications and Digital Technologies Stella Ndabeni-Abrahams and Eastern Cape Premier Oscar Mabuyane officially opened the first Innovation and Digital Skills Centre in Mthatha on 11 June 2021.

The center is a partnership between the Department, the Eastern Cape Provincial Government and Liquid Intelligent Technologies South Africa. The centre is a state-of-the-art that will allow young unemployed people from underprivileged communities to use it for job hunting.

The introduction of the fourth industrial revolution (4IR) requires young people and entrepreneurs to have digital skills, and the COVID-19 pandemic has proven the need to embrace the 4IR.

The opening of the centre is part of government's plan in partnership with the private sector to ensure that young people benefit from these skills. The opening of the centre will equip students and unemployed youth with digital skills in line with government's priority to empower them to start their own husinesses.

Courses offered are designed to allow students to learn more about Microsoft Office fundamentals. Learners are taken through basic Microsoft Word, Excel and Outlook skills. The course will introduce learners to the design thinking process and illustrate best practices for each step along the way.

This is part of a three-part course where learners will be taken through the fundamentals, programming concepts and instructions on data structures and algorithms.

"The opening of the centre proves that government and the private sector can work together, when we are investing in young people, we are investing in the future," said Minister Ndabeni-Abrahams. She further said the 4IR has proven to be a platform that enables people to access services and that it is an economic driven platform.

"I am so excited the course has enabled me to understand Microsoft even more." said one of the student beneficiaries. She also said that she has been using Microsoft Word to do her assignments, but through the course, she has learnt that there are other features she can use to be creative when doing her assignments."

Programme uplifts communities

Thusong Service Centre outreaches attract many community members who are not able to access services from various government departments and partners.

Thusong mobile outreach activities were held in Merweville and Nelspoort on 22 and 24 June 2021 respectively, as both towns are among the most economically poverty stricken in the Central Karoo District Municipality.

In order to access most services people, need to travel to Beaufort West or Laingsburg costing many of them money they do not have, hence the outreaches are often held to bring services closer to the people.

The Department of Employment and Labour, Easy Pay, Small Enterprise Development Agency, Disaster Management, South African Social Security Agency, Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development, the Electoral Commission, Department of Social Development, Home Affairs, Department of Human Settlements, MICT SETA, Department of Transport and Public Works, Department of Health, Right to Care and the South African Revenue Service were all in attendance.

One of the Thusong Service Centre partners Easy Pay, which is part of the Net 1 Group of Companies and strives to provide secure affordable banking accounts to the unbanked, handed out wheelchairs to Gloria Storm and Lilly Stemmel.

Gloria Storm, who resides in Merweville, has been immobile for the last few months due to illness and has struggled to leave the house.

Lilly Stemmel, from Nelspoort has been in a wheelchair for the past year and half since she lost both her legs to diabetes. She has been very fearful of the old wheelchair she has been using since it provided no front safely to ensure she does not fall out of it.

Storm and Stemmel are both immensely thankful to Easy Pay for the wheelchairs and the local government Thusong Service Centre Programme for bringing much needed services directly to the people.

Youth engage on economic recovery

The Government Communication and Information System supported the Mpumalanga Department of Education together with the Thaba Chweu Local Municipality and the Mpumalanga Legislature during a Youth Month engagement, which focused on economic recovery, at Ehlanzeni TVET College, Mashishing Campus, on 14 June 2021.

The session sought to tackle socio-economic challenges faced by the youth of Thaba Chweu Local Municipality, and to device strategies for youth empowerment and employment through sustainable partnerships.

The Executive Mayor of the municipality, Councillor Friddah Nkadimeng, said that a collective approach is essential towards addressing the socio-economic challenges facing the municipality.

She said that the closing down of businesses due to the COVID-19 pandemic and other factors had an adverse impact on the local economy, thus contributing to the high unemployment rate. This also affects the municipality's ability to collect revenue, thus hindering the provision of basic services.

Mayor Nkadimeng said that the Municipality's Economic Recovery Plan has identified mining, forestry, agriculture, and tourism as essential catalysts towards reigniting the local economy.

The Principal of the TVET College drummed up support of the business sector in the fight against the COVID-19 pandemic. He said the college is in dire need of personal protective equipment to ensure the protection of both the lecturers and students against the pandemic.

Mbuyane also said that the integration of theory and practical is important to ensure students' responsiveness to the dynamics of the market.

Glencore South Africa representatives confirmed their continued support to the college through an allocation of R5 million towards the building of extra lecture rooms.

Bridget Mathebula from the Mining Qualifications Authority said that they assist the TVET college through the capacitation of lecturers and the work placement of students.

The Student Representative Council also raised concerns that students should be given first preference in local mines in order for them to gain skills and sharpen their knowledge through learnerships and also by absorbing them when there are vacancies. This will assist in economic development for the Thaba Chweu Local Municipality.

The public-private-partnership remains a fundamental weapon for economic recovery after the COVID-19. The networking sessions by the Ehlanzeni TVET college will be sustained to establish critical partnerships required for the growth of the institution.
