At the end of the session, the top-five matric learners of 2023 were honoured with certificates and the educators whose subjects received 100% were also honoured with certificates by the Municipality and Matwabeng Stakeholder Forum

# GO GEORGE helps learners to plan best route

This year's GO GEORGE took place on 19 January 2024 in the Garden Route District where senior learners used the opportunity to learn how to use the network of routes and fixed schedules of GO GEORGE to their advantage. School children are an important component of passengers using the GO GEORGE bus service daily.

# Government engages members of the public

On the 12 January 2024, the Deputy Minister of Police, Cassel Mathale, joined by the Deputy Minister of Health, Sibongiseni Dhlomo, the Deputy Minister of Correctional Services, Inkosi Patekile Holomisa, the Deputy Minister of Justice and Constitutional Development, John Jeffery, and MMC Social Services, Khanyisa Mhlanga from the City of Mbombela graced the South African National Defence Force Club engagement session in Mbombela.

The Deputy National Commissioner for Support Services, Lieutenant-General Lineo Ntshiea, outlined the purpose of the engagement, which was to provide a platform to discuss crime-related challenges faced by these communities. With the sole purpose of ensuring policing services and actions that promote diversity. This engagement sought to establish and strengthen the fight against crime perpetrated against the LGBTQIA+ and people with albinism.

Communities were given an opportunity to raise concerns about the experience they encounter as LGBTQIA+ and people with albinism both in society and even when approaching government services before the Deputy Ministers could respond.

During the messages of support, the Deputy Ministers spoke on one voice that their employees in their respective departments are now trained to handle LGBTQIA+ and people with albinism. They emphasised that privacy should be prioritised. Deputy Minister Jeffery said at all correctional centres, they have now provided cells to accommodate all LGBTQIA+ as per their category so that they feel safe and secured.

Deputy Minister Mathale used the platform to create awareness on the strides made by the South African Police Service (SAPS) in ensuring the promotion of diversity and inclusivity. He said that the SAPS developed and distributed the Standard Operating Procedure to respect, protect and promote the rights of LGBTQIA+ persons with objectives to continuously create awareness to members on how to provide a respectful, inclusive and supportive service to LGBTQIA+; to prevent secondary victimisation and ensure the protection of constitutional rights of the LGBTQIA+ community.
