Rural schools receive mobile science laboratories


On 14 September 2015, Deputy Minister of Communications, Stella Ndabeni-Abrahams, opened two science laboratories at Ngangolwandle High School in Lombola village, Elliotdale and Thubalethu High School in Fort Beaufort. The science laboratories were donated by the National Youth Development Agency (NYDA) and will assist science learners to do their practicals. Speaking at Thubalethu High School during the handover of the science lab, the Deputy Minister said, "Our country needs young people like you who want to work hard to make our nation stronger and better."

Responding to why government was spending energy on a project focused on finding answers to the creation of the universe while the country is facing many socio-economic challenges, the Deputy Minister said, "The field of science and technology holds the promise of solving many of the challenges that we face. We will gain new knowledge that will lead to innovations that will accelerate economic growth and increase the country's competitiveness."



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The Deputy Minister also motivated the learners, urging them to work hard to realise their dreams. “Your future begins today and with hard work and dedication you will emerge with the skills and knowledge to make a difference in our communities and the country. I have no doubt that South Africa will, in the future, call upon your skills in mathematics and science that began right here in this science lab,” she concluded.

Through strategic partnerships, both schools have been beneficiaries of the state-of-the-art information technology equipment donations that were led by Deputy Minister Ndabeni-Abrahams. The visit provided an opportunity for government to monitor the usage of such equipment and assess the impact it has on improving the quality of teaching and learning in both schools. Proceedings ran concurrently with the Career Expo where various government entities exhibited and shared valuable information on available opportunities that young people could explore.





OUTCOME 2: A LONG AND HEALTHY LIFE FOR ALL SOUTH AFRICANS

KwaZulu-Natal intensifies the fight against HIV and AIDS

KwaZulu-Natal Health MEC Sibongiseni Dhlomo launched a dual-protection billboard campaign on 4 August 2015 as part of making inroads in the fight against HIV and AIDS in the province. MEC Dhlomo unveiled the first of the 69 billboards at the Mangosuthu University of Technology.

The MEC believes that since KwaZulu-Natal has the highest rate of HIV and AIDS, it must lead in advancing efforts aimed at creating an HIV and AIDS-free generation. He said the campaign is poised to enhance the fight against the spread of HIV and AIDS in the province.

On the day, 11 similar billboards were unveiled throughout the province’s 11 health districts while 57 would be posted at various sites in the coming weeks.

In the Amajuba District, the unveiling of the billboard was at KwaMathukuza township, led by the District Mayor, Councillor Jabu Khumalo.

The dual-protection approach promotes medical male circumcision and the use of female contraceptive methods such as Implanon, injections and the loop method while encouraging the use of condoms during sex. This ensures protection against both sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and unwanted pregnancies.

Councillor Khumalo was joined by the Amajuba District health managers, health organisations, civil society and interfaith leaders. She urged men to support medical male circumcision. “Statistics have shown that Amajuba District has a low circumcision rate compared to other districts in the province, we need to change that. Men should visit clinics and learn about circumcision and how it can lower the chances of contracting STIs,” she said.

She encouraged young women to use female contraceptives. “Do not be ashamed of carrying condoms in your handbags; consider it as a way of avoiding unwarranted and unplanned pregnancy,” said the Mayor.

Statistics show that South Africa’s unplanned pregnancies contribute significantly to the high drop-out rate at high schools and tertiary-education institutions. The statistics further reveal that approximately one million babies are born each year and 8% of them are born to teen mothers.

The health department was on site rendering health services and engaging with community members.









Boskop community members receiving services from government departments and the South African Police Service stalls.

Thusong Service Centre Week exhibition

The launch of the annual Thusong Service Centre Week took a form of an exhibition comprising ward councillors and members of ward committees who reached out to community members. About 500 delegates attended the event. Government materials such as leaflets, *Vuk'uzenzele* newspapers, Integrated Strategy on the Development and Promotion of Cooperatives, Western Cape transport newsletters and anti-corruption brochures were distributed at the exhibition.

Key achievements and positive stories of the Thusong Service Centre programme were shared with the public. Ward-committee members consisted of intersectoral representation from business, tourism, sport, health, early childhood development, construction, youth, entertainment, etc.


