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



Municipality sanitizes public spaces and facilities

On 4 April 2020, Dipaleseng Local Municipality in Mpumalanga embarked on a programme of sanitizing public spaces and facilities. The programme, which involved deep cleaning activities, was led by the municipality's Executive Mayor Mafunda Makhubu, the Gert Sibande District Municipality Disaster Management and other stakeholders.

The team sanitized the Balfour Police Station and taxis at the Balfour and Siyathemba taxi ranks. They also distributed hand sanitizers and leaflets, and shared information on various measures of combating the spread of COVID-19, including washing hands frequently with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, covering the nose and mouth with tissue or a flexed elbow when coughing or sneezing and avoiding close contact with anyone with cold or flu-like symptoms.

Mobile clinics to service Duduza community

On 2 April 2020, the City of Ekurhuleni Executive Mayor Mzwandile Masina and member of the mayoral committee for Health and Social Development Councillor Nomadlozi Nkosi delivered two mobile clinics to service the community of Duduza – following the closure of the Duduza Clinic after a nurse tested positive for COVID-19.

The Executive Mayor said the clinic and the surrounding areas will be sanitised during the period of closure to kill any traces of the COVID-19 virus that may have survived on surfaces. The nurse who tested positive for COVID-19 has since been placed under quarantine and is currently under medical observation. Other staff members who displayed symptoms of COVID-19 have been tested and are currently under self-isolation while those who have not displayed symptoms have been placed on special leave to self-isolate until further notice.

Staff from surrounding clinics will be deployed to the mobile clinics and will be required to wear personal protective equipment and practice stringent hygiene protocols when working with the public.
