Anti-corruption roadshow

North West hosted the first provincial anti-corruption roadshow in the Dr Kenneth Kaunda District municipality from 30 to 31 August 2023, aimed at raising awareness on anti-corruption and promoting the National Anti-Corruption Strategy 2020 – 2030. The deputy chairperson of the National Anti-Corruption Advisory Council (NACAC), Nkosikazi Nomandla Mhlauli led the roadshow together with the Acting Premier of North West, Nono Maloyi. NACAC, which was appointed by the President in August 2022, is an advisory body on matters related to fighting corruption and the effective implementation of the anti-corruption strategy.

First day of the roadshow saw government departments, municipalities and the anti-corruption agencies engage on a community awareness motorcade in the City of Matlosana Local Municipality. Various spots were identified where the community was engaged on anti-corruption activities and reporting platforms such as the hotline. The Special Investigating Unit and the Hawks were some of the leading agencies that presented to the community.

On the second day of the roadshow, the NACAC engaged the provincial government in a formal setting. The aim of the engagement was to get the provincial feedback on the implementation of the National Anti-Corruption Strategy and plan for the national dialogue to be held later in the year. Provincial partnerships were also solicited to assist in the implementation of the strategy.

It is anticipated that other provinces across the country will follow with their anti-corruption activities.

Murraysburg embraces garlic business

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On 5 September 2023, the Government Communication and Information System visited Murraysburg Garlic (Pty) Ltd, which was born in 2017, when the first 1 000m2 was planted in the community through funds provided by the Newborn brothers in an endeavour for them to secure the future of employees who had been employed on the family farm for a long time. The project has five permanent employees, with 35 seasonal workers to assist with planting and ploughing throughout the year.

With a R 1.5 million cash injection from the Western Cape Department of Agriculture in 2021, Murraysburg Garlic (Pty) Ltd has just completed construction on a fully operation garlic processing plant that will open later in this month. The factory will allow the business to harvest, clean and crush garlic faster increasing their exports across South Africa and employing more seasonal workers from the community.

Garlic is a winter crop, taking 25 to 30 weeks to be matured for harvest. Garlic is frost resistant so it can grow in almost any climate but because of its cooler weathers the climate in the Karoo and the Bushveld are among the most

ideal. This is evident in the fact that from one piece of land, Murraysburg Garlic (Pty) Ltd now have several fields throughout the town to plant during the season.

Murraysburg Garlic (Pty) Ltd is a thriving business, their garlic can be found in local retail stores and they have some experimental garlic strains planted this year to check if they can expand to even more national and international markets.

Processing Manager, Martha Booysen who has been with the Newborn family for decades, highlighted that "This business is such a legacy for my family and me. It will be what I leave behind to them and I am very proud of this factory and the impact that it will have on Murraysburg."
