During the State of the Nation Address on 11 February 2021, President Cyril Ramaphosa outlined government’s plans to boost the country’s economy.

The President said government is focusing on four priority economic interventions, which are: a massive roll-out of infrastructure throughout the country; a massive increase in local production; an employment stimulus to create jobs and support livelihoods; and the rapid expansion of energy generation capacity.
