Free State delivers state-of-the-art stadium

“Government is working hard to ensure that the lives of people change for the better.” These were the words of Free State Premier, Ace Magashule, at the opening of the state-of-the-art stadium in Bloemfontein on 21 October 2015. The stadium was one of the biggest projects in the province and costed government more than R300 million. The stadium was named Dr Rantlai Petrus Molemela Stadium in honour of the founder of Bloemfontein Celtic Football Club and will be used as a home ground by Bloemfontein Celtic.


Sport and Recreation Minister Fikile Mbalula attended the launch. The Minister and the Premier handed over the stadium to the Executive Mayor of Mangaung Metro Municipality, Councillor Thabo Manyoni. Minister Mbalula emphasised that he does not want to see the stadium become a white elephant. He further indicated that the stadium accommodates all sporting codes and if properly used, it would keep children off the streets and away from crime.

The project has created jobs and changed lives of the people of Mangaung Metro Municipality.

Mayor officially opens new bridge

The Executive Mayor of Rustenburg Local Municipality, Mpho Khunou, officially opened the Ramochana bridge in celebration of Transport Month on 22 October 2015.

The Mayor was helped to cut the ribbon by a child who was dressed in traditional clothes, who was among the first people to cross the new bridge. Rustenburg community members gathered at Ramochana bridge at 17:30 to witness the opening of the new bridge, the first of its own kind in the area.

The bridge is part of the Rustenburg rapid transport system, YARONA, which will bring a transport revolution in Rustenburg. It also connects with existing systems of rail, buses and minibus taxis, ensuring that people move around the city easily.

The Mayor said that the project has created employment opportunities for the local community. “Many people from Rustenburg who were unemployed are now employed as a result of this project. We also used the local contractor to build this bridge and we are proud of that,” said Mayor Khunou.

The bridge will also boost the economy of the mining companies around Rustenburg.

The project is being funded from the coffers of national government to develop road infrastructure for the Rustenburg rapid transport system and is estimated at around R2 billion.

Khayamandi community benefits from mobile programme

Government has implemented 120 Thusong Service Centre outreach projects in the Western Cape, assisting 140 000 citizens to access government services and information. About one million citizens access services through the Thusong Service Centres in the province.

In the Western Cape, the Thusong Service Centre mobile project is used to bring government services closer to communities.

The mobile programme visited the Khayamandi community from 14 to 15 October 2015 and assisted 633 community members in need of government services. Various government departments were based at the Khayamandi sports field, where residents came to access services. The Department of Health offered voluntary HIV, TB and blood-pressure testing services. The Department of Home Affairs assisted community members with applications for identity documents (ID), passports, birth and death certificates.

The Office of the Public Protector provided information on its role and how members of the public can report complaints to the office. The Department of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries provided information regarding how unemployed young people can access bursaries from the department to further their studies in the agriculture field.

Young people also received information from the Department of Social Development on career opportunities and advice on how to live a healthy lifestyle.

The programme was also supported by Nedbank and First National Bank. The Department of Public Works presented application forms to young people who intend to further their studies in the field of engineering.
