Tshwane's Region 6 Communicator Forum puts focus on present fathers

On 7 May 2025, members of the Tshwane Region 6 Local Government Communicators, Forum (LGCF) attended a workshop and film viewing at the Council Chamber of the Mamelodi Thusong Service Centre.

The session, organised by an organisation called Heartlines and titled: "Fathers Matter", focused on promoting the active, positive presence of men in the lives of children. While acknowledging the extraordinary role that single mothers and grandmothers play in the lives of children, the project aims to highlight the risk factors associated with the absence of fathers or positive male figures in the lives of children.

After showing two films, Mr Gerhard de Koker from Heartlines said," According to research, children who grow up without the active, positive presence of

men in their lives, are at significant risk of being victims or perpetrators of violence, including gender-based violence and femicide, drug and substance abuse, mental health disorders, teenage pregnancy and poor educational and economic outcomes." He differentiated and defined biological fathers and social fathers such as uncles, grandfathers, church leaders, teachers, coaches, male influencers and role models.

"It is vital that fathers be positively present in the lives of their children and always consider the children's interests before their own; and show this by their actions." Even if a father lives in a different home, city, village, country or is no longer with the child's mother, he can be present and show interest in the child's life," said Mr de Koker.
