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
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“This is a priority programme, one of the problems is that there is a silo planning. There is a lot of planning done but not known by all the stakeholders involved. Captains of the industry are here, we need the private sector to overcome the challenges we have. We need to think of how we can make sure there is sustainability in the sector. We need to have a committee to share ideas and get mentors in the industry,” said Solomzi Madikane, the LED Manager in Overstrand Municipality, during his welcoming address.

The facilitator from Cape Peninsula University of Technology mentioned that it was very important to appreciate that community members have not destroyed municipal infrastructure when they are not satisfied with service delivery. She further encouraged the sector to go back to basics such as the promotion of community engagements to avoid working in silos.

A representative from Abagold Ltd mentioned that there was a massive industry in the aquaculture sector in Hermanus. He said, “Phakisa plans are credible on paper, but private sector and people in the business have challenges in accessing funding”. He also mentioned that there is an incredible power that exists in the industry and getting solutions to those challenges would bring incredible results.

It was agreed that as part of the action plan, there was a need for multi-stakeholder forum to take issues that were identified and get solutions for them. These challenges should be small-scale fishery related. We need to look at the inclusive development strategy so that we make Operation Phakisa to work. LED in the Overstrand Local Municipality will invite stakeholders and take it from there.

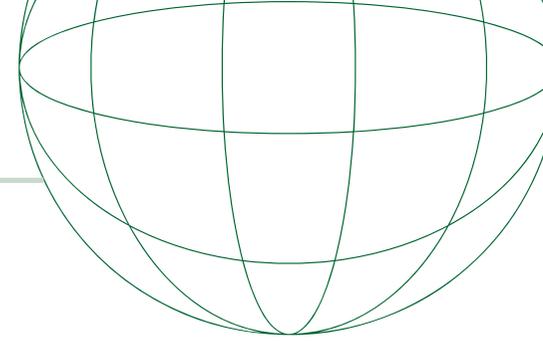
A total of 42 individuals actively participated in the seminar and showed interest in ensuring that there were continuous engagements taking place.

“The programme was very informative, having to engage with other stakeholders who are sharing views under the same goal, to better our sea economy.”



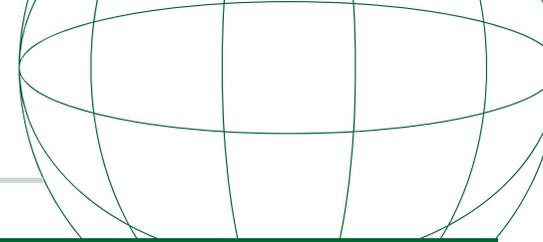
Cynthia Booysen said:

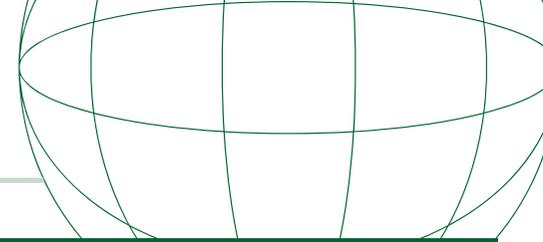

Somerhoek wellness receives a wellness centre

On 18 July 2016, AgriAids SA in partnership with the Ephraim Mogale Local Municipality and the Department of Health (DoH) officially opened the wellness centre facility at Somerhoek farm as part of the Nelson Mandela International Day commemoration.

Somerhoek farm is located in the Ephraim Mogale Local Municipality, approximately nine kilometres west of Marblehall town. The farm’s management took a decision to refurbish an unused building to pave the way for the accommodation of the clinic, which will assist the farm workers in particular as far as health-related issues are concerned. The DoH will provide medication and other consumable items while AgriAids SA will provide clinical and administrative personnel.

In his keynote address, the acting Sekhukhune District Executive Mayor Fanie Lekola indicated that the opening of the clinic would give the farmers in and around Somerhoek access to health services. “Those who are working on the farms are working not for their families alone but for all of us as they produce food that we consume daily,” he said. He acknowledged that the opening of the clinic at Somerhoek coincided with the International AIDS Conference, which took place in Durban.

Services such as HIV counselling and testing, screening for non-communicable diseases, pap smear for women and referrals for voluntary medical male circumcision were offered.

Hendri Solomon, the manager of Somerhoek farm, thanked all the stakeholders and sponsors of the event for the opening of the clinic. “Farm workers no longer have to travel too far to access health services. This clinic at the farm will save them time and costs of traveling to Marblehall town,” he remarked.
