COVID-19 vaccination launch

Free State Premier Sefora Ntombela and Health MEC Montsheng Tshiu hosted the provincial launch of Phase 2 of COVID-19 vaccination programme on 17 May 2021, targeting persons who are 60 years and above at Thekolohelong Welfare Centre in Phuthaditjhaba, QwaQwa.

The Premier provided the provincial COVID-19 update, and informed community members that the provincial government is there to save lives through vaccination.

She also informed the community that the Thabo Mofutsanyana District has about 65 000 elderly people while Maluti-A-Phofung Local Municipality has about 28 000 elderly people whom all will be vaccinated during Phase 2 of the vaccine roll-out programme.

The Premier also encouraged community members to continue adhering to COVID-19 regulations, ensuring that they wash their hands, keep a social distance and wear their masks.

The Executive Mayor of Maluti-A-Phofung Municipality Masetjhaba Lakaje-Mosia and Mofumahadi Mathokoana from Bakoena Royal Council were also vaccinated as part of the programme. Community members are encouraged to assist those who are over 60 years and above to register for the COVID-19 vaccination.

Electrification of rural communities

The Minister of Mineral Resources and Energy, Gwede Mantashe, conducted an electrification project inspection in Mthatha West, Maiden Farm and Bongweni in King Sabatha Dalindyebo Local Municipality on 17 April 2021.

The Minister was joined by Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs MEC Xolile Nqata, O.R. Tambo Executive Mayor Councillor Tokozile Sokanyile and King Sabata Dalindyebo Local Municipality Executive Mayor Nyaniso Nelani.

The Department of Mineral Resources and Energy has electrified 1 100 houses around Mthatha through the Integrated National Electrification Programme (INEP), which aims to provide electricity throughout the country with a specific focus on rural areas.

The visit to Mthatha started with a stakeholder engagement session with the King Sabata Dalindyebo business sector, traditional leaders and interest groups. Community members raised their concerns about different electricity tariffs provided by the municipality and Eskom. The last leg of the Minister's visit was a physical walkabout, where he visited six homes that belong to senior citizens at Maiden Farm and Bhongweni. Minister Mantashe donated wheelchairs, blankets and groceries to underprivileged families.

"Today's visit is a typical demonstration of the District Development Model (DDM), the CEO of Eskom is here, and municipalities are here," said Minister Mantashe.

He further stated that the DDM requires all sectors of government to pull resources together, and make a difference. "Through the INEP working with municipalities, we will ensure that all villages receive access to electricity," added the Minister.

Government takes services to the people

The Deputy Minister in The Presidency, Thembi Siweya, hosted a servicedelivery initiative in Tosca, Dr. Ruth Segomotso Mompati District on 30 April 2021, for community members to access essential government services and support.

The session included mobile stalls that provided government services offered by the Department of Home Affairs, Department of Health, Department of Employment and Labour, Department of Social Development, South African Police Service, and National Youth Development Agency.

The initiative was a response to the Department of Planning, Monitoring and Evaluation's frontline monitoring report, which highlighted a need for service improvements in Tosca.

Neigbouring villages including Pomfret and Bray attended the event and also raised their challenges. Some of the issues raised included water shortages, registration of children for birth certificates, unemployment, and shortage of clinic, secondary school and recreational facilities.

Government leaders who were present included Deputy Minister of Police, Cassel Mathale, Social Development MEC Boitumelo Moiloa, Deputy Minister of Employment and Labour, Pinky Moloi, Members of the Provincial Executive Committee, and District Mayor Kgalalelo Sereko.

The leaders engaged with community members and also promised that the community of Tosca and other villages would receive assistance regarding their challenges. Governemnt services were provided at the event, and community members also received information products, which included the *Vuk'uzenzele* newspaper.
