Khakhu Traditional Council promotes human rights By Doctrine Netshikweta: GCIS, Limpopo

The Government Communication and Information System in partnership with Khakhu Traditional Council, Department of Social Development, Department of Health, the Pastors Forum and Khakhu Victim Empowerment held a Human Rights Dialogue at Ha-Khakhu in Limpopo on 19 March 2021. The purpose of the dialogue was to share information on human rights while at thaze same time, educate the community members on how they can exercise their rights.

Vhakoma Vho-Nethononda Khakhu said the traditional council wants to be in forefront to ensure that people live in peace and harmony. "Going forward, any human rights violation within my jurisdiction will be considered a serious crime as enshrined in the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa. All community members must treat one another with respect and dignity," he said.



Daba Avhatakali said: "As South Africans, we are under a constitutional democracy, which is underpinned by the Bill of Rights enshrined in the Constitution. We are urged to respect, protect, promote and fulfil the rights of people."

He also noted some of the challenges with water supply in the community that government is currently attending to. The traditional leader emphasised the promotion of social cohesion and nation-building. Nelson Nevhutalu from the Pastors Forum indicated that as a faith-based organisation, they are assigned the responsibility to protect the nation through spreading the word of God.

Community members received information material such as the *Vuk'uzenzele* newspaper and the Constitution booklet to learn more about their human rights.

Monitoring of school sanitation infrastructure

Mpumalanga Education MEC Bonakele Majuba visited four schools in the
Bushbuckridge Local Municipality on 23 March 2021, to monitor progress
on sanitation projects. The projects include the construction of sanitation
infrastructure for Saile Primary, E.S Malele Secondary, Kufakwezwe
Secondary and Ntsie Primary schools.

¹ The MEC was satisfied with the work done, which is the construction of ablution facilities, drilling of boreholes, and provision of water tanks and installation of hand washing fountains.

The Provincial Department of Education intends to completely eradicate, pit latrines in school within the 2021/22 financial year. Thus far, there are 189 projects that are underway in this financial year and every effort is being made to ensure that they are completed within the stipulated period.

The Principal of E.S Malele Secondary School, Salome Timba, could not hide her excitement for the school infrastructure improvement. "Today our school has 12 enviro-loos constructed. Our learners and teachers will no longer stress on issues of safety and health. Our learners, teachers and the community at large can now focus on teaching and learning delivery," she said.

She added that the school and community at large appreciate what government has done for them. "We are now safe from cracked and dilapidated restrooms."

"The provision of ablution facilities is a human-right issue that was supposed to have been addressed long ago. I am satisfied with the progress made today; however, I expect that we work around the clock to deliver on this mandate. We must ensure that the pit latrines are eradicated within the stipulated time frames," said MEC Majuba.

The MEC also urged all role players to accelerate the process, where possible, to complete the projects. The Bushbuckridge Local Municipality promised to assist with water provision through water trucks to refill the tanks should the school be affected.





PRIORITY 2: ECONOMIC TRANSFORMATION AND JOB CREATION.

Infrastructure projects to create more jobs

Northern Cape Premier Zamani Saul together with his executive council, engaged in a meeting with a delegation from the Investment and Infrastructure Office in The Presidency, led by Kgosientsho Ramokgopa on 23 March 2021 in Port Nolloth, Richtersveld Local Municipality, in Namakwa District.

The meeting formed part of continued engagements with the Investment and Infrastructure Office/Infrastructure South Africa and the Northern Cape Provincial Government on infrastructure planning, management, and investment to ensure the coordination of key infrastructure investment projects in the province.

The key project in discussion during this engagement was the R13.2 billion Bogoebaai Port and Rail Infrastructure Project in the Namakwa District. This is a deep-water port development which will have a dry bulk terminal for exports, liquid bulk terminal to handle various bulk liquid products and a multi-purpose container terminal.

The project is one of the biggest infrastructure projects in the province and is envisaged to create an estimated 20 000 jobs, which include construction, operational, and indirect and induced jobs.

The Investment and Infrastructure Office will work closely with the province to ensure that this project, together with other key strategic infrastructure ones such as the Small Harbour in Port Nolloth and the Green Hydrogen come to fruition to ensure job creation and the growth of gross domestic product within the Oceans Economy.
